In this week's Parsha, the Parsha discusses the importance of being in Eretz Yisrael.

והארת  
אתה עמך  
על ארץ ישראל

Moshe is saying that you will have plenty to eat and drink and you will never be hungry. Then the Chumash says: *וְאֵלֶיךָ יָבֹאוּ כָּל־בְּנֵי־יִשְׂרָאֵל וְיֹאמְרוּ אֵלֵינוּ כְּכֹחַ אֲשֶׁר־עָשָׂה לְךָ אֱלֹהִים*

The Pasuk is dealing with how much Hashem looks over Bnai Yisrael and is always watching what happens to us, and He does this watching especially in Eretz Yisrael.

The Rabbeinu Tam explains in these two P'sukim that the first Pasuk is the physical atmosphere of Eretz Yisrael and the second Pasuk is dealing with the spiritual aspect of Eretz Yisrael.

The Ramban disagrees with this and says that the first Pasuk is also spiritual and that it doesn't mean drink, like water or soda. It means drinking the Torah in the learning sense.

THIS WEEK'S PARSHA: 2,708 B4 LTP, 300

It is written twice in this week's Parshat Ekev - the term, "בְּעִצְמוֹתָם יִשְׁכַּח" Most Meforshim explain this term, "stiff-necked people," as a stubborn and persistent nation, lending towards a negative connotation. But it can also mean a people who are incapable of turning its head, especially backwards.

This characteristic of the Jews has helped the Jewish nation to survive through all the tragedies and holocausts throughout its history. With the help of the Torah, Jews have been kept from despair since "the meaning of life embraced the wider cycles of life and death." People suffer in this world to carry out their roles as, and play their role for good or evil.

From this Parsha, we realize how important history is in our religion. 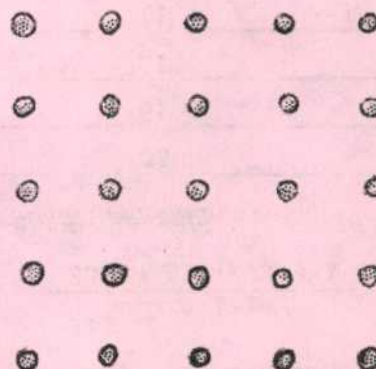

**DEMOCRATS IN SENATE RACE WOOING N.Y. JEWS**

The five Democratic contenders for the U.s. Senate nomination from New York are fiercely vying to demonstrate that each is the best friend of Israel.

With the exception of unemployment, the question of Israel has come up more often than any other issue so far in joint appearances of the candidates, their press releases, position papers and campaign literature.

The reason is found in the mathematics of the Democratic Senatorial primary, which is to be held September 14th, where the Jews are likely to be the largest single group voting. In the Presidential primary in New York, 365 of 1074 Democratic voters questioned in a survey by the New York Times said they were Jewish.

Istanbul, August 11th: A grenade explosion ripped through a line of passengers waiting to board an Israeli El Al jetliner tonight, and police shot it out with a group of terrorists who were apparently trying to attack the aircraft.

Four persons were killed in the explosion and 20 persons were wounded, the state radio said. The semi-official Anatolia news agency said two terrorists had been captured and had identified themselves as Palestinians.

The radio said that Turkish security policeman stationed at the airport had thwarted an attempt by the terrorists to reach the Israeli plane, a Boeing 707 that was parked 100 yards from the passenger terminal. The aircraft was undamaged and flew on to Israel as scheduled, the radio said.

The radio said the casualties resulted when the terrorists threw a grenade into a line of passengers in the terminal building.

The Anatolia news agency said that the two captured terrorists had told the police that they were members of the "Dr. George Habash Organization," presumably a reference to the Popular Front For the Liberation of Palesyine. Dr. Habash heads this group, one of the many splinter Palestinian organizations.

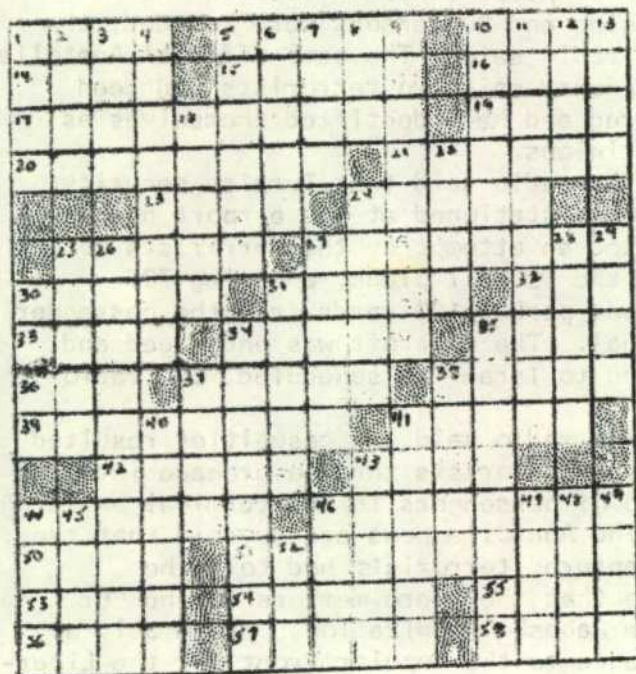

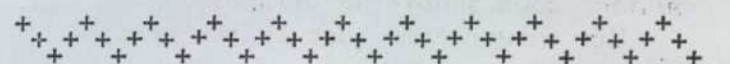

# MORASHA SPORTS

ANSWERS TO LAST WEEK'S QUIZ:  
SO YOU KNOW YOUR BASEBALL?

1. FALSE. Although it's true that a pitch which strikes the ground in front of the plate must be declared a ball even though it later passes directly over the plate, such a pitched ball is not a dead ball the moment it strikes the ground. The umpire must wait until the ball actually passes the batter before he may rule on it. If the batsman strikes at it and misses it, it is a strike. Conversely, if he hits it into fair territory, it's a hit.

2. TRUE. A batter may change his batting position from one batting box to the other batting box as often as he wishes. The only restriction is that the batter may not change his position while the pitcher is in the pitcher's box ready to deliver the ball.

3. FALSE. A batsman is not entitled to run for first base when a third strike is dropped if first base is already occupied by a runner on his team and there are less than two out. First base is presumed to be occupied on a dropped third strike, if it was occupied by a runner at the time of the pitcher's wind-up. This is so even though the runner makes second before the ball crosses the plate.

4. FALSE. A batter may assume any crouch at the plate he wishes, provided he is not patently attempting to make a travesty of the game. The rules require that the pitcher throw the ball over the plate, so that it passes between the batsman's knees and shoulder, as he is standing at the plate.
