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SHCHARANSKY SENTENCED

Anatoly Shcharansky was convicted and sentenced to 13 years in prison and labor camps this week.

We have much to learn from him through the message which he delivered to the court which sentenced him. The following is his final paragraph.

"For more than 2,000 years the Jewish people, my people, have been dispersed. But wherever they are, wherever Jews are found, every year they have repeated, "N ext year in Jerusalem." Now, when I am further than ever from my people, my Avital, facing many arduos years of imprisonment, I say, turning to my people, my Avital: Next year in Jerusalem.

N ow I turn to you, the court, who were required to confirm a predetermined sentence: to you I have nothing to say."


One of the many interesting staff members of Camp Morasha is David Ribner. He comes to us with a varied education of experiences.







B'nai B'rith Kallah/ Morasha LTP Day

For the fifth consecutive year, the LTP Program of Camp Morasha had a 'bne-day seminar" with the B'nai B'rith Kallah Group, and both found it a very enlightening experience.

The boys and girls from B'nei B'rith Youth Organization (BBYO) come from a wide spectrum of life, ranging from relatively Orthodox backgrounds in major citles such as Montreal, to being the single Jewish family in a Colorado town. These kids are searching for their Jewish identity, and being affiliated with BBYO spend a month or two in a camp atmosphere that, according to one boy. "I learn how to live Jewishiy."

Through daily sessions where the campers are exposed to various ppinions of Judaism, the camp attempts to create a marketplace of Judaic values for the campers who, after studying the different types presented to them, choose those which appeal to their understanding, and find Ju-

daisn fulfilling.

The meeting of the two groups shattered a stereotype for each. The BBYO Kallah nembers saw Orthodox tesagers just like themselves- not black hats and ourls- who live normal lives within an Orthodox framework. The Morasha campers, for the most part, had their first experience with a large group of non-Orthodox youths. Although some encounters seemed like clashes. the two groups found no beariers e-/ xisting between then, and a unique type of closeness developed both ou the individual and the collective level. Some friendships even blossomed out of this rare yet short experience.

The thems of the day was "Jewish _____ Values in a Non-Jewish World" and such aspects as the difference between Jewish and Western ethics, interparriage honesty, drug use and sexual morality were discussed in variegated small groups of 20 kids bach. Many of the

BETO campers opened up in these sessions, and Morasha was at times set aback with their frankness. The Orthodox Morashaniks felt themselves as representatives of Orthodoxy. It was therefore very difficult for some of the Morashaniks to be honestat in the classes, and at times, both groups suffered. But towards the end of the hour and a half discussions, there was a complete breakdown of all pressures, and the discussions benefitted all.

It was a truly unique experience in the fact that the EBYO bids are unique. These are Jews that want more than anything to identify with Judaism, and they deserve equal if not more credit than we do, for we who are brought up in frum homes see no other option, and we find no conflict in observing Shabbat and Kashrut. But these are kids who are constantly exposed to non-Jewish circles, and still seek a closer tie to their religion. They want to le arm and know, and with almost an insatiable appetite, they came over to us and inquired about our ideas of Judaism.

The performances at night, from bot h camps, really reflected the spirit of the day, each sing ing three hebrew songs, and teaching one song to each other, as a form of exchanging of ideas. The night was spiced with Israeli dancing, and the Ruach displayed by the IBYO kids is one that even we should emulate, A symbolic exchanging of books between the camps culminated the event, ending perhaps the most enlightening experience for many of the participants.

It's difficult for us to comprehend, for we who lead our sheltered lives can not appreciate the internal conflict of these teenagers that made them choose to under-stand and know more of their heritage. We must not neglect the fact that the Talmud and our basic traditions are in to us, but if we do not attempt to study and learn in order to understand why we believe, then in one respect, we are no letter than the YIKO DA we so often chide.
