TISHA B'AV TO BE OBSERVED ON THURSDAY

Tisha B'Av, which will be observed this Wednesday night and Thursday, is the saddest day of the Jewish calendar. On that day we are all considered mourners and observe certain prohibitions. Everyone who can and is old enough abstains from eating and drinking. Even those who are not required to fast should not eat more than is necessary.

In addition, on Tisha B'Av we do not bathe or shower or wash past the knuckles (except to remove dirt), wear leather shoes or even shoes that are partly leather, use oils, cosmetics, lotions (except deodorants if necessary) or brush one's teeth.

Since the heart rejoices from the study of Torah, we only learn those parts of Torah that are relevant to Tisha B'Av (Eichah, Kinot, Hilchot Tisha B'Av and those parts of the Gemara that deal with the Churban Babylonia).

One does not greet people on Tisha B'Av, even to say "Good Morning". However, if one does not the law and greets you, you may answer him softly. Also, until noon we sit on the ground or a low stool, rather than a chair. Finally, one should not walk for enjoyment and should be generally careful in spending his time so as not to come to levity on Tisha B'Av.

PARSHAT DEVORIM- SHABBAT HAZONE

This Shabbat, Shabbat Hazone, we will read Parshat Devorim. Thus, we will begin reading the speech of Tochocho and Hazoro that Moshe delivered to B'nei Yisroel before he died and they entered Eretz Yisroel respectively. The first parok, as Rashi explains, mentions all the places at which B'nei Yisroel had sinned. Moshe is reminding B'nei Yisroel of their sins at this time for a specific reason. The previous generation was condemned to wander in the Midbar for forty years instead of entering Eretz Yisroel as had been planned, because of their sins. In order to assure that B'nei Yisroel does not repeat these Avrot and will indeed enter Eretz Yisroel, he reminded them of the fatal mistakes that their fathers had made.

As the Ramban says in Hilchot T'shuva, one of the first steps of T'shuva is recognizing the Chet and making a Kabala not to repeat it.

Among the Chatoim that Moshe recounts is the Chet Hamaranlim (Spies). As the Gemara calculates, the night that the Meraglim returned from Eretz Yisroel with their misleading report and the night that the Jews cried as a result of this report was Tisha B'Av. At that time Hashem said that since B'nei Yisroel had cried for no reason on that Tisha B'Av, in the future He will give them a reason to cry on that date. This reason is obviously the two Churban: Batei Hamikdash. And since we know that in every generation in which the Beit Hamikdash is not rebuilt, it is as if it were destroyed in that generation, we see that thus far, the Chet: im which caused the destruction of the Beit Hamikdash are still with us today.

However, if we take an example from Moshe and B'nei Yisroel and well look back at our Chet: im and try not to be ensnared in them again, perhaps we can be Zocheh to be the Dor of "Bo'u Urshu et Haaretz" through B'as Hagoel and Binyan Beis Hamikdash.

ABOUT A SIYUM

We abstain from eating meat and drinking wine during the Nine Days for two reasons. One, a person experiences simcha by eating meat and drinking wine. In addition, we recall sacrifices of the meat and wine which were suspended because of the destruction of the Beis Hamikdash.

However, eating meat and drinking wine is permitted on Shabbat, and at a Seudat Mitzvah. A banquet made in honor of learning a complete Mesechta of the Talmud or of a Seder of the Mishna is called a Siyum.

Not only may the person who completed the Mesechta or other work, his family and the waiters eat meat, but even relatives and friends, and since at Moresha, all of us are friends, especially of the Talmidei Chachamim, we are all included.

This year Siyumim will be made by Zvi Reich, Larry Wachsmann, David Laks on Thursday and by Neil Maron, Danny Wolf, and Avi: on Monday.

A BIT OF CHRONOLOGY

On the Seventh of Av the enemy entered the Beit Hamikdash. They ate, drank, and defiled it on the seventh and eighth. On the ninth, they set fire and it continued burning until sunset of the tenth.

The reason that the fast was not designated the tenth of Av- even though most of the Beit Hamikdash was burnt then- is that the beginning of the catastrophe is considered to be more tragic.

Because the burning continued until the 10th of Av, all the laws of the Nine Days continue until midday on the tenth.

However, when Tisha B'Av falls on Thursday, so that the tenth of Av is Erev Shabbat, haircuts and washing clothes are permitted Thursday night in honor of Shabbat.

MEDSPEAK

In addition to swimmer's ear and ankle sprains heat stroke and heat exhaustion are common occurrences in the summer months. (Ask Label Carl, waterfront, for confirmation.)

Heat stroke or sunstroke occur on warm or stifling hot days ("heat wave"), especially after prolonged strenuous exercise. Onset may be quite sudden and often is heralded by weakness, headache, light-headedness and nausea. The camper may have fainted. His skin will often look red and feel hot and dry (sweat may be present). His pulse will be rapid and weak. His temperature will be elevated often to 105-106. Most authorities recommend rapid cooling to 100-101 then slower further cooling. Crushed ice over wet towels applied to chest and abdomen, blanket soaked in cold water spread over patient or immersion in a tub of cool water may be helpful. Of course, he should be treated in the infirmary.

Heat exhaustion or heat prostration is often difficult to distinguish from the above except for the following characteristics differences. Pulse is usually about 100. Temperature is normal, and the face looks ashen and sweaty. Heat exhaustion is secondary to loss of fluid (an average runner or ballplayer lose about a half gallon of fluid in sweat per hour) and unless the individual is accustomed to this he can easily succumb to heat exhaustion. This applies even to well-trained athletes. Treatment is aimed at the replacement of fluids with water and even mild salt solutions. Patient should be laid flat in a cool room.

Prevention is still the best medicine for the above two conditions. Avoid tre-

ONE SIDED FIGURE

Last week's Math Question" Can anyone construct a one-sided figure?" is a classic problem of topology, a branch of geometry. Topology, is the study of those properties that an object retains under deformation; such as bending and twisting, but not tearing. To construct a one-sided figure- cut a rectangular strip of paper 12 inches long and paste the ends after giving one end half a twist (180° turn). You will now have what mathematicians call a Möbius strip named after its discoverer. To prove that this figure has only one-side, take a pencil and draw a line down the middle of the strip. You will notice that without crossing a boundary, you will have drawn a line on the entire surface of the figure, thus constructing a truly one-sided figure. If you are unable to construct this unique figure, ask your counselor or me for assistance.

Concern for one's feelings plays a major role in making halachic decisions. We find that sort of example in Masechet Bicurim. Originally the Kohen would first chant the portion of the Torah to be said when bringing Bicurim for just those individuals who were unable to recite the portion themselves and then they would repeat this portion after the Kohen. This practice was later amended by having the Kohen read for everyone. Thus, a person who could not read would not be embarrassed.
