

PARSHAT PINCHAS

In Parshat Pinchas, Moshe, nearing the end of his days, received some of his final instructions from Hashem. Hashem told Hoshe to climb Har Avarim and see Eretz Yisroel since Moshe would be unable to enter the Land. Moshe then asked Hashem to appoint a new lea- Korban Tamid- the korban which was brought der who would lead B'nei Yisroel into Eretz Yisroel. In response to Moshe's request, Hashem instructed Moshe to publicly appoint Yehoshua ben Nun as the next leader of Binei Yisroel. After these instructions to lioshe, the Torah discusses the laws of the Korbonos which were to be brought daily and of those Korbonos which were brought on Yom Tov.

Why does the Torah relate the laws of the Korbonos after telling us some of Moshe's final instructions?

The Mayam Loaze provides the following explanation:

As long as Moshe was alive, the merits of Moshe served as a Kaporah (an atonement) for the sins of B'nei Yisroel. However, now that Hoshe was soon to die, Hoshe's merits would no longer protect B'nei Yisroel. B'nei Yisroel would now need the daily and Yom Tov Korbonos to serve as an atonement for their sins. Therefore the Torah placed the laws of of Torah study in Camp Morasha this summer. Korbonos immediately following Hashem's instructions to Moshe prior to his death. Hashem wanted to tell B'nei Yisroel that the Korbonos and not Hoshe would now atone for their sins.

We see from this/great gift that Hashem gave us when He instructed us to bring Korbonos. The Korbonos were a medication which helped to rid ourselves of our sins and thus protect us from harm.

Weeks, a time in which we mourn the destruction of the Beis Hamikdash and the abolishmentbos. of the Korbonos, we should try to look for ways in which we can atone for our sins. TORAH TALK

In this week's Parsha we find a listing of the Korbanot that were given during the time of the Bet Mikdash.

First among the sacrifices listed is the every morning and every evening. The importance of this Mitzvah is reflected in that one of the reasons for the fast of Shiva Asar B'Tamuz was " Butal Hatamid" - the Korban was no longer given.

Though there is no longer a Korban, the concept of 'Tamid' is essential to Yahadut. Our relationship to Hashem has to be Tamidalways without exception- and our relationship to our fellow Jews has to be Tamid- always.

During these weeks preceding Tisha B'Av we mourn the fact that there is no more Korban Tamid. However, the obligation of T'midut- constant love and devotion for Torah and Mitzvot must take the place of the temporary absence of the Mikdash.

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

The camp of the Jews in the wilderness was as big as a city 12 miles square!




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GOOD ADVICE
