

OUR FACULTY WRITES. . .

A THOUGHT ON T'FILAH - PARSHAT EKEY

The M'komot T'filah in camp reflect a feeling of respect for davening and an awareness of the Beit K'nesset as a house of T'filah and a Beit Hashem.

But for many of us, when we return to the city and to our own synagogues, we find ourselves in an environment where Tefila plays second fiddle to socializing, current events, sports, and stocks.

The end of Parshat Ekev features the second paragraph of the Shma, V'hoyoh in Shmoah. On the posuk, "U'lavdo b'chol l'vavvchem" serving Him with all of our heart, Chazal say: What is the service of the heart? That is Tefila l Even though "U'lavdo b'chol l'vavvchem" isn't written in a commanding tone, most poskim agree that daily Tefila is a Torah obligation. To speak to Hashem directly, with words expressing praise, thanks, and any needs we may have, is the daily obligation of every single Jew, male or female.

Each of us might be able to compose our own Tefila, in our own words, that includes these elements. A student of mine once wrote: "Hashem, you are my best friend (praise). I thank you for the chance to make today a better day for those I love (thanks). Hashem please help me make the right decisions as I go through my day (needs)." For those of us who are not gifted with language, the siddur is an open book that helps us find the right ideas to speak to Hashem in a way that draws us closer and closer to Him.

As we approach Chodesh Ellul and the Yomim Noraim, we all have a great deal to talk over with Hashem. By really concentrating on our Tefila with our whole heart, our Tefila can really reach the Kisay Hakovod.

A D'VAR TORAH ON

PARSHAT EKEV

In this week's Parsha, Moshe admonishes Bnei Yisrael: "Et Hashem Elokecha
Tirah" - and you shall fear Hashem."
The Gemara comments that Shimon Haomsoni
would darshon all the "Ets" in the Torah. However, when he reached this posuk
he was unable to find a suitable interpretation. Finally, Rebbe Akiva explained
that the "et" in this context teaches us
that we must fear Talmedei Chachamim as
well as Hashem.

The relationship between fear of Hashem and Talmedel Chachomim can be explained via a parable offered by the Magid of Dubno: Once there lived a blind man who secured a visa to travel to a foreign country. Unable to travel alone. he was accompanied by a guide. Upon reaching the border, the customs official asked to see the blind man's visa. He willingly acquiesced and produced the necessary document. The official looked at the visa and said, "This allows passage for only one individual. Your companion must stay here." The blind man retorted," But it is written that I am blind and it's understood that a blind man can't travel alone."

Similarly, the common Jew is 'blind" in his service of Hashem. Only our Talmedei Chachamim who dedicate their lives to expounding the Torah of Hashem can instruct and guide in our "Travels" as we seek to improve ourselves. While the Torah only specifies fear of Hashem, It is understood that our 'Visas' through life must include fear of our "guides"- the Talmedei Chachamim. By fearing them we will be able to fulfill that which follows in the posuk: and to Hashem you will cleave." This message is noteworthy as we approach Elul- the month which symbolizes "Ani l'dodi v'dodi li" and lY'H we will be zocheh to another year of life in which we can perfect our Avodat Hashem.



PARSHAT EKEV AND TEAM TZEDAKAH

The Green Team, Tzedakah, has an interesting relationship to this week's Parsha. What does a group of youngsters have in common with an ancient writing? It has to do with what one of them believes and the other teaches.

In Parshat Ekev, Devorim 7:12, the Torah lists the actions Hashem will perform for
Am Yisroel, telling us what Hashem will give
them. Chachamaynu explain that just like Hashem is opening His arms to us and gives us
whatever we need, we should do the same, without fear of loss following the words of the
Posuk, that translated says," cast your bread
upon the waters and you will receive it thousandfold." But Parshat Ekev doesn't just
talk about the future, it discusses the past
as well. In 8:16 it mentions how Hashem
helped in the Midbar, feeding us the way we
do others today: on Purim with Matanot L'Evyonim, on Pesach with Maot Chittim, and every week on Shabbat with Tomchei Shabbas.

From there Ekev goes on to tell us how we should help the poor, the widowed, and the orphaned, clothing and feeding them, giving them homes and incomes, just as we do today for homeless.

And this team Tzedakah is convinced that if we all work together, anything is possible, even an enormous task such as that of helping the thousands of homeless existing today to improve their situation in life. This group of young people also stress that it is important to work together, because man cannot stand alone. He needs the help of Hashem and his fellow human beings to exist.

A D'VAR TORAH ON PARSHAT EKEV

This week's Parsha begins "V'hoyo ekev Tishmun". The word "ekev" is translated to mean when: "And it will be when you accept these laws." The question arises as to why the word ekev is used as opposed to "kaasher". We know from the story of Jacob's bitth that ekev is also translated to mean the heel of the foot. Pashi writes that ekev is used to emphasize even the small easy Mitzvot that we consider unimportant and trample on them with our heels.

The Baal Haturim writes that just as when you walk the heel comes after the rest of the foot and cannot be seen, one should perform Mitzvot in the same manner and not seek the attention of others.

The Ramban offers a different translation for the word ekev. He claims that it is synonomous to the word B'avor which means because. "And it will be because you keep these laws that Hashem will keep his treaty and chesed which He swore to your fathers."
