NEWSBRIEFS . . .


At last count almost \$1500 was raised in this year's JNF drive at Morasha. We purchased almost 250 trees to help renew the forests rayaged by enemy fires.

OUR FACULTY WRITES .

ON PARSHAT REAH

There is a classic exegetical principle that seeks to connect the beginning and end of sidros of the Torah. Parshas "Reah" begins with the word reah and ends with the Mitzvah of R'eiyah. It would seem rather avident that the Torah is teaching us something about seeing and being seen.

When the Torah says "Reah Anochi", there is an implied statement that each individual must see himself on three different levels. A person must first carefully examine his Anochi, his inner self and see if he has fulfilled the potential of his "Tzelem Elokim". The second level of seeing is directed to another Anochi. This Anochi refers to Moshe Rabbeinu. (We find in Parshas V'eschanan that Moshe says "Anochi amad bein Hashem U'velneichem). Each person should look at the glorious and majestic personality of Moshe and realize the great heights that a human can reach.

There is a third and ultimate sighting required of man. That is to see the Anochi of Anochi Hashem Elokechah. There must be an awareness of the pervasiveness of that Anochi in all that man does. This is clearly expressed in the posuk: Shevisi Hashem Linegdi Somid.

When one sees that his personal Anochi is in accord with the ideal Anochi personified by Mosheh, and subjects both to the Will of Hashem, then he will merit to see Hashem in His Mikdash.

May it be the Will of Hashem that we fully direct our Anochi 's to His service and merit Yireh Vayroeh - He will see and will be seen.

A D'VAR TORAH ON

PARSHAT REAH

The first posuk in this week's Parsha is "Reah Anochi Nasan Lifneichem Hayom Bracha V'kilalah." The Sefarnu explains this posuk to mean that the Torah is giving all of K'al Yisroel a guiding path in which to conduct one's life. He explains that one should not behave in a Beinoni manner as, unfortunately many people do. They are not consistent in their Avodas Hashem; sometimes they do Mitzvos and sometimes not.

However, Hashem says that there are two diametrically opposite paths, a Brachah path and a K'lallah path. The B'racha path guarantees that one will have more than what one needs to live. However, the Klallah path insures that one will be lacking what he needs to live. One has a choice which path to take, and one cannot walk on both.

In order to be on the path which guarantees complete B'racha, one must be consisitent in one's Yiras Shomayim and Mitzvos.

The Yiras Shomayim and the Midah of Chesed that we have attained in camp this summer should not be left here; rather, we should take it home with us and have our lives be permeated with Chesed and Yiras Shomayim.

Consistency is the key as we should all be steadfast travellers on the Brachah path.

Good Shabbos...and K'sivah V'chasima Tova.





*** THE WAREHOUSE CREW ***

Perched at the entrance to Camp Morasha, in a structure fondly called "the warehouse" is the hub of Morasha's maintenance-delivery-shut'l operations. It is here that a crew of five young men, directed by Rabbi Richie Auman, executes the demands of this department.

During the year Rabbi Auman is the Educational Administrator of the BiCultural Day School in Stamford, Conn. Two of his staff are the Sarasohn (as in Michelle) brothers from Charleston, S.C. Oldest brother Chaim is retired from the same position. Jeffrey is a senior at Y.U. where he majors in economics and will be counselling in the dorm. Younger brother Jonah (4th out of 5) attends the College of Charleston with a major in computer science.

Boruch Walters, the senior member of the staff, has been coming to Morasha from his residence in Israel. Assaf Erez, new to Morasha this year, will be starting F.I.T. where he will be preparing for a career in advertising/photography. Elan, the overnight man, introduced him to Morasha.

Most vocal of the crew is Gary Wallin, formerly of the Morasha Music Staff. Besides being on the road with Schlock Rock, Gary is a full time music teacher at the Stamford Bi-Cultural Day School under Rabbi Auman who was once his D.H. and Shiur teacher here.

Some responsibilities of this illustrious team: Mouse catching, bus driving, late night plunging, newspaper delivery, shut'l driving, hospital runs, and shopping till the wee hours of the morning (it takes time to collect 400 Kosher Hero rolls and 40 canisters of fluff)

Vehicles at their disposal include three vans, two busses, one station wagon, a CCM/ hoopamobile, one truck, Boruch's motorcycle, Gary's bicycle, but only one golf cart (not nearly enough, they claim).

What do they look forward to most: August 28. The most rewarding part of working at Morasha: Not the money, they concurred. Their advice to us: "Keep calm, ask politely, and be patient, 'cause we'll be there to help."
