

### ON SHABBAT NACHAMU

It always struck me as strange how on Shabbat Nachamu we read the very same portion that we read on Tisha B'Av. The Torah says:"Ki toled banim ubnai banim v'noshantem baretz" . . .that you will have children and grandchildren and become accustomed to the land and you will start to worship idols which will result in your banishment from Eretz Yisroel. On Tisha B'Av it is obvious why this was read for this explains to us the very essence of that day. Is it mere coincidence that the very same p'sukim are part of this week's Torah reading of Parshat V'etchanan - the Shabbat which is dedicated to "Nechama"?

Perhaps we can learn a very important lesson about Nechama. The process of consolation is not at all to be confused with forgetting. When Tisha B'Av ends we are not permitted to forget about churban and just go on with our daily lives. Rather "nechama" revolves around understanding the tragedy and taking the lessons of that tragedy and using them to strengthen our "emunah" in Hashem. When we read "Ki tolid banim . . . on Tisha B'Av we were mourning. When we read it this Shabbat, we are learning.

Hopefully we will learn and understand the reasons for Galut and be able to improve our characters and our "emunah" so that we may all be zocheh to experience the ultimate "Nechama"— the coming of Moshiach Bimhera Veyamenu.

### PARSHAS VAESCHANAN

"Do what is upright and good in the eyes of Hashem" (Devarim 6:18). Both Rashi and Ramban tell us this posuk means we must go beyond the letter of the law in dealing with others. In fact, the Gemara (Bava Metzia 30b) states that Yerushalayim was destroyed because its inhabitants failed to go beyond the letter of the law, and insisted on their rights under the strict law only.

But, Tosafos ask, didn't we learn (Yoma 9b) that the Churban was caused by Sinas Chinam, unjustified hatred? Which was the real cause? Rav Zalman of Volozhin explains that the people of the time were guilty of Sinas Chinam (and other sins as well) for which they deserved to be punished. Yet the Gemara (Megillah 28a) says that if someone forgives other people, Hashem will be forgiving of him— Mida K'neged Mida. So as long as the Jews went beyond the letter of the law and were forgiving of each other, Hashem forgave them and overlooked their terrible sins. But when they insisted on their rights under the strict law, Hashem also applied the strict law and Yerushalayim was destroyed.

We see from this the importance of overlooking the faults and offenses of other people, even when the strict law is on our side. After all, who can afford to be judged by Hashem according to the letter of the law?



# The 15th of Av Day of Joy

Ask the average person what is special about 15 Av, and he'll probably tell you that it is the only day of the year that is exactly six days after Tisha B'Av. In other words, most people think Chamisha Asar B'Av (the 15th of Av) is a very ordinary day. It wasn't always that way, During the centuries when our ancestors lived in Eretz

## 1. The day the dying stopped.

When our ancestors sinned in the wilderness, Hashem decreed that the 600,000 adult male members of the sinful generation would not be permitted to enter Eretz Yisroel. Each year on Tisha B'Au, the anniversary of their sin, 15,000 of the people died a quiet, natural death. This went on for thirtynine years until only the last 15,000 sinners were left. Tisha B'Av of the fortieth year came and went - and all the men were still alive! Had they miscalculate the date? Another day went by, and another and another. Finally, they saw the full moon in the sky. That meant that it was definitely the lifteenth day of the month, long after Tisha B'Av. Hashem had forgiven them - they would be permitted to enter Eretz Yisroell They were overjoyed, and the entire Jewish nation rejoiced with them.

## 2-3. The Tribes are free to!

There were two occasions when the right of girls to marry was limited. The first is told in the Torah. Hashem wanted each tribe to be sure that all its land would remain within the tribe for at least Israel's first generation in Eretz Yisroel. But there was a danger that this would not happen. Let's say, for example, that a girl from Shevet (tribe) Ephraim married a man from Slevet Yehuda. Her children would belong to Yehuda. If she were to inherit land from her father - who was from Ephraim - it would pass to her sons after she died. Then the land would no longer belong to Ephraim. To prevent that from happening, the Torah said that a girl who had inherited land should marry someone from her own shevet. (The Torah also said that this law would not be permanent.)

The reasons for joy kept piling up from the time our ancestors were still in the wilderness to the time after the destruction of the Second Bais Hamikdosh. There were six reasons altogether. Here they are

limited came after a war that all the tribes waged against Shevet Binyomin to punish it for a cruel sin. The eleven tribes agreed that none of their daughters would marry anyone from Binyomin.

After a certain number of years, the Sages of Israel decided that the time had come for both bans to end — it was on Chamisha Asar B'Av. It was a day of double Joy, because both decrees were ended and all the tribes were enabled to unite with one another.

## 4. The roads to Yerushalayim were opened.

When King Yerovom ben Nevot persuaded ten tribes to secede from the monarchy of King Rechavom (grandson of Dovid and son of Shlomo), Yerovom had a problem. If Jews continued to go up to the Bais Hamikdosh as all good Jews wanted to do, they would be in Yerushalayim where Rechavom was king. So Yerovom set up guarded roadblocks to prevent his people from going to the Bais Hamikdosh. The roadblocks



stood for over 200 years, until King Hoshaya ben Eilo removed them. Finally, everyone was free to go to Yerushalayiml

## 5, The day the wood-cutting was ended.

shortage of firewood, but when our ancestors built the Second Bais

Hamikdosh, there was almost no wood for the Mizbayach (altar). The enemies of Israel had cut down nearly all the trees in the land. Not only that, but when people traveled far and wide and found wood, our enemies tried to prevent them from bringing it to Yerushalayim. Naturally, therefore, whenever a family brought a supply of firewood to the Bais Hamikdosh, thousands of people joined in the celebration. Any wood that was brought to Yerushalayim had to be left in the sun to dry all through the summer so that it would burn crisply when it was needed. By the middle of Au, the days were becoming shorter and the sun's rays weren't as strong, so all the wood



was gathered from the fields and stored for year-round use. Chamisha Asar B'Av was the date when the hard task of wood preparation was successfully completed — and every Jew rejoiced.

## 6. Betar's dead are buried.

After the destruction of the Bais Hamikdosh, one of the major Jewish cities in Eretz Yisroel was Betar. The cruel Romans found an excuse to declare war on it and massacre its entire Jewish population. When the killing was over, the vicious Roman leader Adrianus (Hadrian) would not allow the Jewish people to bury their dead. Only years later, after thedeath of Adrianus, the new emperor gave permission to bury the Jewish dead. The Jews rushed to Betar - and found a miracle. Hashem had preserved the bodies as if they had died that very day. They were brought to burial the final honor we pay our dead - on Chamisha Asar B'Av.

How do we mark this date nowadays? The Sages taught that by the middle of Av, the sun sets earlier and the nights grow longer. That is when we should start using our nights for extra study of Torah — the greatest symbol of Jewish joy.
