

Be willing to do the right thing even if it is not popular.

"AND THE ALMIGHTY SPOKE TO MOSHE SAYING: PINCHOS THE SON OF ELIEZER THE SON OF AHARON THE PRIEST HAS TURNED AWAY MY ANGER FROM THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL IN THAT HE WAS ZEALOUS FOR MY SAKE AMONG THEM, SO THAT I DID NOT CONSUME THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL IN MY JEALOUSY." (Bamidbar 25:10,11)



NEW FACILITIES AND NEW STAFF ADDED FOR MORASHA '91

Under the direction of Rabbi Abraham Wahrhaftig, Morasha '91, with new facilities enriching old ones & new members added to the dynamic staff, is well underway.

Additions on boys' campus include a new staff house, a sports complex, a path around the campus, and new courts. On Girls' a new conference room for meetings of the Division Heads has been added to the H.C. A new wing has been built onto Day Camp Headquarters where a water fountain will also be installed. MIDRESHET MACHON ENHANCES LTP PROGRAM

This year Machon is not the same. No, Machon has not been shifted somewhere else like Mechina has, nor have they stopped participating in BBYO and Yachad programs. But this year there is an enhancing addition. Yes, there is a refrigerator in the girls' lounge (as well as a heater, fan, and blender), but there is still a more significant novelty.

Under the leadership and planning of Rabbi Hashie Billet, for the first time ever in Morasha, there is an organized learning program for girls of Machon Age, dubbed "Midreshet Machon" by the camp administration. Consisting of five girls (with a sixth coming in August)—Dassi Billet, Malki Cohen, Sara Feit, Rachel Hellman, and Leah Schacter, and supervised by Shana Feiner, this program provides an opportunity for girls to learn in a camp atmosphere while enjoying the benefits and counselling training of Machon.

The learning schedule consists of four sessions of shiurim in the morning (commencing at 9:30 AM): Mrs. Rookie Billet for Rabbinical Responsa dealing with women's issues, Rabbi Billet—topics in Halacha (researched through Gemara and Rishonim), Rabbi Saul Berman—Hilchut Ishut of the Rambam, and one period of preparation time. In addition, nightly shiurim are given by Rabbi Allen Schwartz—psahat and drush, and Rabbi Raymond Harari—Gemara Massechet Pesachim which all Machon and staff members are invited and encouraged to attend.

This program, the first of its kind, has born fruit after years of hope and planning. Through the efforts of the administration and the enthusiasm of the participants, it has finally been implemented. The five Midreshet Machoniks, in addition to learning, work in the afternoons, and participate in all Machon activities.

Barbara Deutsch, Director of the Machon program and overseer of Midreshet (as well as interior decorator of the Strick Library where the learning takes place) has not only provided us with "awesome" cubbies, an air conditioner, and a folding door, but has succeeded in blending the two programs into one.

OUR FACULTY WRITES. . . .

ON PARSHAT HASHAVUA

In this week's Torah reading in Parshat Mattot we read of the request of B'nei Gad U'venei Reuven to settle in Ever Hayardane. After agreeing on a plan with Moshe the Torah tells us that Chatzi Shevet Menashe along with B'nei Gad and B'nei Reuven settled the Ever Hayardane. How did Chatzi shevet Menashe get involved with Ever Hayardane? No where do we find that they requested to settle that land.

One of the suggested answers is that Moshe realized that if B'nei Gad and B'nei Reuven would remain alone in Ever Hayardane over the course of time they will lose their connection to Eretz Yisroel. Moshe felt that they will settle Mechutz L'Eretz and prosper in their land and forget that the true place for Am Yisroel is Eretz Yisroel.

Therefore Moshe insisted that Chatzi Shevet Menashe join them in Ever Hayardane for they, being the shevet of B'nos Tzelaphchad, were known for their love of Eretz Yisroel. The Chatzi shevet Menashe will want to maintain a close relationship with the other chatzei of Menashe in Eretz Yisroel as well. The Chatzei Shevet Menashe would insure that B'nei Gad and B'nei Reuven would also remain committed to the other Shevatim and to Eretz Yisroel.

Hopefully, though we live Mechutz L'Eretz we also feel that Chatzi Hashevet is in Eretz Yisroel and that Im Yirtza Hashem we will have the z'chut to join them soon.

A D'VAR TORAH ON. . .

PARSHAT MAASEI

We find in Parshas Maasei, the halacha for a person who accidentally kills somebody else. The Torah says that he must run to a special city called an *eir miklat*, and live there until the *kohain gadol* dies. If he does not do so, he is in danger of being killed by the dead person's relative.

This law, at first, may seem problematic. If the killer only killed accidentally, why does he deserve to be punished? Therefore, to understand the halacha, one must differentiate between different types of accidents. There are accidents that could have been prevented and accidents that could not have been prevented. The Torah only holds responsible one who has killed "b'shogaig" meaning that the killer was actually careless, and should have been more cautious with his actions.

Rav Goldvicht, the Rosh Yeshiva of Keren B'Yavneh, has pointed this out and added that the reason the Torah requires him to run to an *eir miklat* is because *Leviim* lived in the *eir miklat*, and the *Leviim* can teach him how to conduct all aspects of his life such that he will not come to do *aveiros*, even b'shogaig.

We can learn from this halacha the trait of "*zehirus*"—watchfulness. A person must always examine his actions to ensure that he will not come to do *aveiros*, even accidentally. The *Masillas Yeshorim* compares a person who does not examine his actions to a blind person who walks along the seashore. Just as the blind person is likely to fall into the water, the person who does not "look at what he does" is likely to do an *aveirah*. When we do *aveiros* b'shogaig, such as accidentally turning on a light on Shabbas, or accidentally eating something that is not Kosher we should not dismiss these *aveiros* as only accidents. Instead, we should realize that they are results of not taking the proper precautions.

Since we do not have *eiri miklat* today, one good way to know how to protect ourselves from *aveiros* is by following the examples set by our *rabbanim*.




