

The story is a familiar one, a scene repeated many a time in history. Our enemies seek a way to destroy the lewish people. In this Parsha, it is Balak, the King of Moav, seeing the counsel of the wise premof Midyon in an effort to ruin Bnei Yisroel, Though Moav and Midyon are actually arch enemies. They are united in their hatred of Bnei Yisroel.

Rashi comments that the advice given by Midyon is :EIN KOCHO ELAH B'PIV- their strength lies in their mouth. Rashi is referring to the KOACH HADIBBUR of the TEFILLAH of AM YISROEL. It is the way we speak to one another and the way we speak to Hashem that allows us to earn the protection provided by the ANNENI KOVOD of Hashem. The sounds of the BATEI MEDRASH- people engrossed in the learning of Torah and the sounds of all our Minyanim beautifully expressing their Tefillot are music to Hashem. It is also the harmonious sounds of BNEI YISROEL NOHAGIM KOVOD ZEH B'ZEH that speaks well of us as a people and enable us to be provided with the protection of Hashem.

As we approach Shiva Osor B'Tamuz, we have the Three Weeks to contemplate the reasons of CHURBAN BAIS HAMIKDASH. We are deeply saddened by our history of SINAT CHINAM and not exhibiting kindness and respect to one another. Yet we can seize the opportunity and turn these Three Weeks into a time of AHAVAT SINAM.

Through our kind actions and kind words to one another may we be ZOCHEH to see SHIBOOD turn into GEULAH, BIMHAYRAH U'YAMENUAMAIN.

A D'VAR TORAH By Uri Orlian High School Kollel

In Parshat BEHAALOSCHA we find that HASHEM has endowed ELDAD and MEIDAD with RUACH HASHEM. The TORAH continues to say that they "prophesized in the camp." RASHI explains the prophecy of ELDAD and MEIDAD by saying that MOSHE will die, and YEHOSHUA will be the one who leads the Jews into the land. The MIDRASH on these PASUKIM quotes a mysterious and vague proverb relating to this incident:


The simple understanding of these words would be " a word for a dollar, but silence for two." Why did the MIDRASH place this seemingly irrelevant proverb into this INYAN?

ELDAD and MEIDAD were given the ability to see what the Seventy Elders were not given. They knew that HASHEM would not allow MOSHE into ERETZ YISROEL after forty years in the desert.

The reason G-D did not permit MOSHE to enter the land was his sin at MEI MERIVAH. This is found in PARSHAT CHUKAT which we read this past SHABBAT. HASHEM commanded MOSHE that in order to procure water for the Jewish people after the Well of Miriam was no longer available, MOSHE should speak to the stone. But, MOSHE hit the stone. But, MOSHE hit the stone, wihtout speaking to it as he had been commanded, and for this he was punished and was not permitted to enter ERETZ YISROEL.

Perhaps now we can understand the meaning of the mysterious MIDRASH. The word "SELAH" has a dual meaning. The way we first understood it, was that a "SELAH" is a unit of money. But the word "SELAH" also means a stone. So when the MIDRASH on the prophecy of ELDAD and MEIDAD said, ATAMEDICAL ACTION AT

With the Fast of the 17th of Tammuz begins a sad period in Jewish life which lasts for three weeks, and ends after the Fast of the 9th of Av (Tisha B'Av).

. These Fast days, as well as the period in between, bring to us memories of unhappy events that took place many years ago, in our most ancient past.

On the 17th day of Tammuz the walls of Yerushalayim, our Holy City, were broken down by the Chaldeans and Babylonians. After a siege of almost three years, the Holy City finally fell into their hands on this day (in the year 3338). For three weeks the enemy ravaged the city, killed many thousands of its inhabitants and besieged also the Bais Hamikdosh, where the remnants of the Jewish defenders fought desperately to save their most precious possessions. But on the ninth day of Av, the Bais Hamikdosh also went up in flames. The surviving Jews were led captive into Babylon, where they remained in captivity for seventy years.

Strangely enough, but clearly by Hashgocho Protis, the same tragedy repeated itself again on the same days, four hundred and ninety years later. This time the Holy City and the Bais Hamikdosh were destroyed by the Romans, under Titus. Again the surviving Jews were led into captivity and exile, and ever since then we have been praying for the restoration of the Bais Hamikdosh through Moshiach, as Hashem promised us through our holy Prophets.

These calamities can be traced back to an earlier tragedy that happened in the days of Moshe, forty days after we received the Torah at Har Sinai. It was on the 17th day of Tammuz that Moshe came down from Sinai carrying the Luchos with the Ten Commandments. He found that the children of Israel had made a Golden Calf and worshipped the idol. Grief stricken, Moshe smashed the Luchos, and thereby showed the people how enormous their crime was. In His mercy, Hashem later forgave His people, but that day was singled out for misfortunes to come, as mentioned above.

Other misfortunes befell our people on the 17th day of Tammuz:

During the siege of Yerushalayim, the daily sacrifices in the Bais Hamikdosh came to an end, as there was nothing more to sacrifice.

Again, Apustumus, a cruel captain of the enemy occupation forces, publicly burned the Torah.

Finally, an idol was placed in the Bais Hamikdosh.

On the 17th day of Tammuz we fast and remember these sad events. But the purpose of it is not to make us sad for a time, for we Jews are a happy people, and even in the midst of sadness we must never feel depressed or discouraged. The purpose of observing these sad days is that we may learn from the mistakes of the past, in order to avoid them in the present and in the future. and moreover to correct them.

Since the calamities were brought about when the Jews strayed from the path of Torah and Mitzvos and disobeyed Hashem's commands, the thing for us to do is to cling all the more faithfully to the Torah and Mitzvos in our daily life. Then Hashem will be merciful to us, His children, send us our long-awaited Moshiach, gather our exiles from the four corners of the earth, rebuild our Holy City Yerushalayim, and our Bais Hamikdosh, never to be destroyed again. Then the sad days will be turned into happy days.


