

Starting off the season was Rabbi Hanoch Teller with an entertaining and educational repertoire of stories and anecdotes. The next week we were treated to an insightful original interpretation by Rabbi Nati Helfgott on why Moshe Rabbeinu was not zocheh to enter Eretz Yisrael. Rabbi Moshe Rosenberg, the following speaker, dealt with the issue of when DODO could be concluded from DKDO.

Prof. John Hove, mesmerized the audience by telling of his incredible metamorphosis from a Lutheran Minister to a committed Orthodox Jew. His acute insights into Judaism led us to a greater appreciation of our "taken for granted" observances. In light of the rapidly changing political climate, the next speaker, Rabbi Michael Miller, provided us with "hot-off-the-press" updates on the Presidential candidates and their stances vis-a-vis Israel.

In preparation for Tisha B'av, introspection and national nilak, Rabbi Mordechai Willig highlighted the reasons for the destruction of both 2) N DA. His mussar-packed message drove home the importance of not repeating the sins of our ancestors by practicing fin nable rather than fin nkje & by idolizing Moshe Rabbeinu rather than the "MICHAELS." Last week we were fortunate to have Rookie Billet share her personal reflections and observations of spending an entire year in Eretz Yisrael with her family: "The stories of the Tanach take on new meaning; the Hebrew language comes alive; Jon permeates the country and materialism takes a back seat to idealism and spiritualism."

We are all familiar with Rashi's comment on the words "V'HOYO EKEV TISHM'OON"- that we must be careful of all Mitzvot even those that a person is wont to step on and disrergard. However, there is another secret to the word "EKEV" which was pointed out to me by Rabbi Blech.

The word EKEV contains the same letters as the word KEVA which means permanent or set. The Torah is hinting to us that in order to receive the BRACHOT promised by Hashem it is imperative that the Mitzvot become part of our everyday routine. It is important that all Mitzvot become part of our lifestyle rather that just something we do from time to time.

Over the summer Camp
Morasha afforded us the luxury to
perform many Mitzvot B'KVIUTwith regularity, whether it was
proper T'filot seven days a week,
proper Brachot before and after
meals, Talmud Torah both in and out
of Sheurim, and a myriad of other
Mitzvot which are built into camp

MIRACLES OF THE MOHD

CHAZAL tell us that only people who ate Mohn could receive the Torah. That is because the MOHN taught our ancestors to trust Hashem and not to worry about the next day. Can you imagine how frightened we would be if the refrigerator was empty at night, and we had no money to buy breakfast for the next day? For forty years after our ancestors left Egypt, no food was left at the end of the night- and every morning the "floor" of the desert was covered with Mohn.

Some of our rabbis tell us that when the Jews aste MOHN, they made a bracha- HAMOTZEI LECHEM MIN HASHOMAYIM.

The MOHN was so holy that it was completely used up by the body; there was no waste.

All kinds of precious jewels fell every morning with the MOHN. The leaders of the people kept them and later used them for the MISHKON.


The MOHN fell only at night while the people were asleep, and not by day. Hashem wanted to show the people that they would have plenty of food without being disturbed from their study of Torah during the day.

The MOHN tasted very sweet for B'nei Yisroel. When other nations tried to taste it, it was very bitter.

Hashem told Moshe to put a portion of the MOHN in a special jar that would be kept in the Mishkon, and then in the Bais Hamikdash. Nearly nine hundred years later, just before the destruction of the first Bais Hamikdash, the jar of MOHN was placed in a deep underground hollow, under the foundation stone of the Holy Temple. There it remains until this very day, awaiting, like all of us, the coming of Moshiach.




What brought our Staffer of this Issue back to Morasha? "I came to watch Tova perform last year in the "Disney Review" and did not want to leave," she responded.

In seeing Campers Close up before they left on trips, your reporter found young women aspiring to a variety of interesting futures.


RACHEL MANSDORF, G 7-age 13, going into Grade 8 at HALB wants to be an author. She lives in Woodmere.
