## **TORAH THOUGHTS**

Two times in the Torah, Bnei Yisrael thirsted in the desert and were miraculously satisfied by water flowing from a rock. In both instances, Moshe produced water from the rock by striking it with his staff. In the first story, at Parshat Beshalach, nothing is wrong and indeed Moshe was told to strike the rock. In Parshat Chukat, the first of this week's Torah portions, Moshe is punished for striking the rock after he was told to speak to the rock to produce water. Our commentaries grapple with the differences between the two stories. First, we must be cognizant of two points within our story: (1) Moshe was told to take the stick in his hand and talk to the rock, (2) our story takes place 38 years after the first, at the end of the 40 year stay in the desert

Now we are prepared to explain the underlying difference between the stories. Hashem purposely told Moshe to talk to the rock with the stick in his hand to teach Bnei Yisrael a valuable lesson. For forty years Bnei Yisrael had been testing Hashem in the desert, and were punished again and again,

Mei Meriva, the Eigel, Kivrot HaTaava, the Meraglim, Korach, and Baal Peor to name but a few. To them, Hashem wielded a heavy stick. Now Hashem wanted to show a new generation, about to enter the Promised Land, that you can discipline with the mouth. Moshe was to teach this lesson with stick in hand- the very symbol of physical punishment, and then choose the tongue to speak, over the stick to beat. Moshe lost this opportunity to teach a new lesson to Bnei Yisrael entering the land and was punished Midah Keneged Midah.

We all stand now towards the end of year 5756. A few short summer weeks separate us and the Yamim Noraim. Camp Morasha affords us excellent opportunities for preparation to enter the "Promised Land" of a new year of Life, Health, and Happiness. This summer's theme is Yerushalayim, the city of our unification. May we all be zocheh to enter her glorious gates, and may we see true peace in our Holy Land.
