TORAH THOUGHTS

In this week's parsha, the Torah warns us about false prophets. It states that even if the navi sheker comes with signs or miracles, we are still prohibited from believing his "prophecies". A question arises from this warning. If Hashem didn't want us to listen to these individuals, why would he grant them the ability to perform signs and miracles, that would lend them the allusion of authenticity? The Ramban tells us that the reason can be found in our parsha (13:4), where Moshe tells Bnei Yisrael "Ki M'naaseh Hashem Elokeichem." that Hashem wants to test Bnei Yisrael.

A fundamental question can then be asked. Normally, a teacher tests a student to determine if he knows the information, or he understands the material correctly. But G-d, who is omniscient, already knows the results of the test. What is the purpose, then, of Hashem testing Bnei Yisrael?

The Ramban answers that the purpose of divine tests is not for G-d Himself, but rather for the

testee. Hashem wants to actualize potential; he wants to show a person how great he can become. Just as a good boxer can only become greater by defeating other fighters, so too, Bnei Yisrael can only achieve true greatness by overcoming their difficult tests.

The Rambam suggests a different purpose for divine tests. He feels that their task is to show non-Jews how to act properly. By watching the example set by Am Yisrael as they overcome their challenges, non-Jews can learn that the true way is to believe in G-d.

In our lives, in and out of camp, each day we face many tests. While they may not take the form of a navi sheker, they still serve an important function in our lives. It is essential that we overcome the challenges with which we are faced. In this way we will realize our full potentials and show non-Jews the extent to which one must believe in G-d.

down on everyone, scorching the fields, cursed by the farmers and laborers. But a huge black cloud moved betweem him and the earth, so that his light could no longer shine on everything below. "How powerful that storm cloud is!" he thought. "I wish that I could be a cloud!"

Then he became the cloud, flooding the fields and villages, shouted at by everyone. But soon he found that he was being pushed away by some great force and realized that it was the wind. "How powerful it is!" he thought. "I wish that I could be the wind!"



Torah Trivia

Here are the answers to the past two week's Torah Trivia questions:

- 1. The Bracha that can only be said on Wednesday or Thursday is Eruv Tavshilin.
- 2. The only *Passuk* in the *Torah* which begins and ends with the same three letters is *Bamidbar 15:41* ("Ani Hashem Elokeichem...").
- 3. The longest word in Torah is in Shemot, 7:28- "במשארותיך".
- 4. The amidah in which we encounter the א-ב backwards is Shabbat Mussaf.
- 5. אתה חונן is the only *Bracha* with a grandfather and grandson mentioned, without mentioning the father (אדם ואנוש).
- 6. The three p'sukim in the Torah with three 2-letter words in a row are: Breishit 5:32, Breishit 35:17, and Shemot 17:15.
- 7. The *pasuk* in the *Torah* which repeats the same five words 3 times in a row is: *Shemot 37:21*.
- 8. One of the origins of the word "daven" is the Arabic word, "Diwan" which is used to refer to religious poetry. Some claim it is related to the word,
- "דאבוהון, Aramaic for "our fathers"- since Avrohom, Yitzchak, and Yaacov were the first to recite the tefilot.
- 9. When Rosh Hashana falls out on Thur. and Fri., Tzom Gedalia is observed on Sunday, and we always read from the Torah on Monday. Thus the Torah is read for five consecutive days.
- 10. The two p'sukim in Torah with all 22 letters of the ב- are: Shemos 16:16 and Devarim 4:34.
