On that Monday night, when we felt alone, there was a very special group of people who stepped in to remind us that we indeed do have family in Camp Morasha. The warmth and support cradled our family in a way that made us feel secure and optimistic at a time of great fear and darkness. We simply knew that our needs, spiritual and physical, large and small, would all be taken care of. Food was regularly delivered to the hospital, (and gratefully received) people organized the recitation of the entire book of Tehillim, in the merit of Sarah Neimah's healing. All this gave us the support we needed to get through this crisis.

Now it is a week later. Our life has gotten back to normal, and every where we look, is a reminder of how so many people helped us in so many ways. We know the individuals who helped us so much during that difficult time would be embarrassed to have their names mentioned here, but we still must say, "Thank you." First we thank you all for the aid and comfort that you all gave so generously. But perhaps more importantly, we thank you for reminding us that here at Morasha, we are all a family and exactly what family truly means.

This may be the first year for baking in our camp, but for Rikki it has been a hobby for a long time. During the year she runs Incr-edible Caterers, Inc., a catering company based in Edison, N.J.

At home, Rikki enjoys creating intricate cakes with multiple steps. In camp, she's starting campers off with simpler projects, like decorating lollipop cookies and making flower pot cakes.

Bringing baking to Morasha was Rikki's idea. Previously she taught arts and crafts in other camps. So far she said, campers have responded to her classes, "extraordinarily well."

Before the summer, Rikki went shopping for all types of supplies, like miniature rolling pins, baking ingredients, and felt tips that have food coloring for ink.



פרשת פנחס - Parshat Pinchas

What is the basic principle and foundation of life? This is a very tough question to answer. Fortunately, the Gemara (Talmud Yerushalmi Nedarim 9:4) tells us that our Rabbis were asked this exact question. The well known response of Rabbi Akiva is that one should strive to always follow - "זאהבת לרעך כמוך" - "to love one's friend or neighbor as oneself." (Kedoshim 19:18)

The Midrash records a different answer to our question, based on a pasuk found in this weeks Parsha. The Torah begins its discussion of Karbanot with the following requirement: (28 : 4 את הכבש אחד תעשה בבקר ואת הכבש שני תעשה בין הערבים (פנחס 4: 28)

The pasuk is telling us that we are required to bring two sacrifices every day - one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The Midrash writes that this pasuk is the answer to our question and the foundation of our lives!

What is the meaning of this strange Midrash?

Apparently, the Midrash is teaching us that the major principle of Jewish life is consistency. While there is value to dramatic heroism (as in the case of Pinchas) and grand slams) the key to success is constant and consistent dedication. The Torah does not give us the option of 14 sacrifices a week or 4 every two days. We must bring two sacrifices everyday without exception. For this reason the daily sacrifice is called the "עלת החמד" - "the constant "עולה "." (Cal Ripken understood this Midrash very well).

We should all put in extra effort to strengthen our daily commitment to ourselves, family and friends, and above all - Hashem.


