Morasha beat Mesorah and Seneca to win the softball tournament. Elon Nat was offensive MVP. David Weiss was tournament MVP.


Daniel Pollack and Noam Block each made outstanding Defensive plays, the latter breaking a finger on the catch.

## Morah Yaffa's Daf Ed



Parshat V'Etchanan - Details Count

In this week's parsha we read about one of the basic prayers that we all learn at a young age: the Shema. Yet in the Torah, and in many of our Siddurim, the first verse of the Shema has two letters larger than others: the y of the word "shema", and the 7 of the word "echad." What is the significance of the larger letters?

One reason given is that the two larger letters spell the word Ty which means "witness." In other words, by saying the Shema, we are bearing witness to the fact that Hashem is one.

Yet the enlarged letters also show us how even the slightest changes can make a tremendous difference. Although both the N and Y are silent letters, if we were to switch the letter Y in "shema" to an N, the word would mean "perhaps." And by substituting the T in "echad" with a T, which looks almost the same, the word's meaning changes to "other." By the time we've finished making these seemingly minor changes, the Shema's meaning is "Perhaps. . . our God is another!"

Anyone who has ever tried baking understands the importance of following directions in a recipe. A teaspoon is not a tablespoon, and baking powder is not the same as baking soda. The person who misses the train understands that one minute really does count. The ice skater who loses the competition knows that one-tenth of a point can determine who gets the medal and who does not.

Torah, like life, is no exception. Details count, and sometimes the smallest difference makes all the difference. One mistake of the shochet could render meat as not kosher. One smudge of the sofer can make a mezuza unfit for use. One unkind word can bring a person to tears. And one new friend can last a lifetime.
