A Meaningful Pause By-Rabbi Neil Fleischman

t the end of last
Week's parsha we
read of Pinchas'
heroism. In the beginning
of this week's parsha we
are told of Pinchas'
reward. The Torah leaves
a noticeable space in

between Pinchas' action and the reward, which it merited. Why did Hashem choose to tell the story in pieces? Why does the narrative pause before telling us the rest of the story?

Rabbi Abraham Twerski cites the Rebbe of Couci's answer to this question:

Sometimes you witness an action someone else took and it is tempting to assume the meaning behind what they've done. But the fact is that deeds only take significance with passing of time. This is the idea of the break between Pinchas' action and his reward. Some people do seemingly heroic acts only to be exposed later hotheaded insincere showoffs. On the other hand apparently gesture negative take on new and positive meaning when seen in light of its full context. Pichas' motives passed the test of time. The space between these two parshiot serves metaphorical testimony that when the dust

cleared, Pinchas remained a hero. This is meant as a model for what we may achieve.

Many of life's experiences, particularly those of youth (both moments which overflow with joy as well as those hurt like forever) can only be fully appreciated later in life. May Hashem bless us all with the pleasure to one-day see great rewards from each moment of this special time in our lives.

Morasha Theme: Summer 1999

All of lashem's creations can be divided into four categories. The first, known as דומם, describes inanimate objects that never change as part of any growth process, and includes such things as rocks, minerals and metals. The second category, אומים includes things that grow and change according to their nature such as flowers, trees, and vegetation; but like inanimate objects, they cannot freely move of their own volition. The third category, in also grows and changes, but moves about freely according to its own will and includes beasts, fish, fowl, and insects. The fourth category includes all who are reading this. And while there are many ways we humans are different from plants, animals and rocks, the one that sets us apart the most, is what defines the fourth category, namely מדבר. Our mouths can be used in the holiest service of Hashem, in teaching and learning, in prayer, or when consoling someone in pain. Yet the same mouth can also be the source of much degradation, slander, and Nivul Peh. Shlomo Hamelech did not underestimate the power of the spoken word when he said מתו וחיים ביד לשון - Death and life are in the hands of the tongue (Proverbs 18:21). Of course the tongue has no hands, yet it has the power to choke the life out of its victim. Moreover, the simple and plain meaning of the word לשון in this verse doesn't refer to the tongue, but to the spoken word. Yirmyahu at (9:7) used the metaphor of the arrow in flight to describe the spoken word, and it is no wonder that Chazal use this metaphor (שחיטה) to describe the process of שחיטה. The spoken word has the power to vow and to ruin lives. When Chazal say that a person should prefer to jump into a fiery furnace than to embarrass someone publicly, Tosofos (Sotah 10b) wonders why it was not included among those three violations for which we prefer death. We answer here, because it is already one of the three - it is murder. Plain and simple. Such is the power of the spoken word. If it can ruin a life it can certainly ruin a summer. As educators and counselors at camp Moresha, we are responsible to assure that our campers use the word properly and appropriately. This means no tolerance for goading and tormenting. This means no Nivul Peh. This means that campers are taught to react with The when a teammate drops the ball or misses the basket or allows the winning goal to score, or a camper spills the soda, or smudges the paint or misses a cue. It is with this sentiment in mind that we have dedicated this summer's theme to לשין the word. This source booklet was organized to facilitate preparation for sources on the theme.
