Even though we are all on separate teams. we have to remember that we are all still part of one unit-Mishpachat Yirael. This idea is illustrated most poignantly by the prophet Yirmiyahu. Yirmiyahu dedicated most of his life trying to save B'nei Yisrael from their ultimate

destruction. He would stand in marketplaces and at public gatherings rebuking the people, telling B'nei Yisrael to give up their evil ways and to do Teshuvah to Hashem. He foretold of the Churban Bayit, the victory of Nebuchadnezar and the exile of the Jewish people. What was the people's response? They hated him. They saw Yirmeyahu as their enemy and that he was against them. They saw him as their opposition, that he was on the "other team" and that he wanted them to be defeated. What they failed to realize was that Yirmeyahu loved them and that he just wanted to save them from destruction. Yirmeyahu was not happy when B'nei Yisrael "lost", he was really on their side the whole time! We can learn a valuable lesson from this situation: Even though people may have different opinions and may appear to be on different "teams" we must remember that we all want what is best for each other. I want to

wish all the teams a Hatzlacha Rabah and just remember - Good Sportsmanship!

THE UNIFYING BOND

Machon/Red Team Throughout Jewish history there have been various events that have attempted to unite the Jewish people around the world. One example of this is the Daf Yomi, which creates a solidarity through the common force in every Jewish persons life-the Torah, Established in 1923 (5684) by Rabbi Meir Shapiro, the Daf Yomi allows the Jewish community at large to learn the same Daf of Gemarah each day. In Gemarah Sanhedrin it states that as Hashem was creating Adam HaRishon, he used dust from Babylonia to form the body, dust from Eretz Yisrael to mold the head, and dust from around the world to shape the limbs. Rabbi Shapiro inferred that the unification of the earth through the culmination of Adam ensured that man would feel secure anywhere on the globe.

The same applies to the establishment of the Daf. The Mishna was created by

Rabenu Hakadosh from Israel. The Gemarah was compiled in Bavel by Rav Ashi and Rabinah, and explained by Tosfot and Rashi who lived in France. The Rambam was from Spain and Egypt, the Rosh, from Germany and the Maharal, Maharshall and Maharsha from Poland, As a result, the Daf symbolizes unity and gives Jews throughout the world the ability to join together through the bond of Torah. Recently we have witnessed how powerful the bond of Daf Yomi can be. After completing the 7 ½ year cycle of learning the entire Shas, hundreds of thousands of Jews from diverse backgrounds and mentalities. joined together for the siyum. The Black Hatter, who sat alongside the man in the Kippah Srugah, and the Chassid who sat next to the Mitnaged, bear testimony to the success of the Daf's ability to create a sense of Achdut through Talmud Torah.

Team Melamdim's underlying theme is the unification of Klal Yisrael through Torah. The historical personalities which we emulate and the places we represent provide us with a wide range of

opinions, Minhagim, and Hashkafot, For instance. Isachaar & Zevulun represent the two main groups of Jewish people - those that learn all day and those that concentrate on working. Similarly, while Yeshivah University represents a Torah UMadah philosophy. the scholars of Lakewoood have a very different ideology. Despite these vast differences, we are all Lomdim, and we are all Melandim. One of our main goals as Jewish people is V'shinantem L'Vanechah- to teach our children our way of life, thereby enabling them to continue the Mesorah and become Melandin.









Three Jewish Historical Events: Kriat Yam Suf, Matan Torah, and Kibutz Galuyot BROWN '99 Nathaniel Fintz B-15 Alufim

Throughout the Jewish timeline, certain well known public events changed and continue to change the face of our religion, our nation, and our future. In addition, we see that different nevi'im were present at these events and often helped make them happen.

Before studying and comparing three such major events, it is important to note that they are all connected in that they affect large masses of Jews at once, giving the events great fame and publicity. The first event, the splitting of the Red Sea, demonstrated God's might to the newly redeemed nation of Israel. It was then that God showed B'nei Yisrael that they were truly far from the cruel hands of the Egyptians. During Matan Torah at Har Sinai, the second great event, often described as the "wedding" of God to His people, Hashem actually revealed Himself to B'nei Yisrael. B'nei Yisrael accepted God's Torah, officially transforming them from ov'dei Melech Par'oh to ov'dei Hashem. Kibutz Galuyot (Ingathering of the Exiles) is a third event that will bring all Jews back to their homeland, Eretz Yisrael. Many believe that it already began on May 14, 1948 with the reestablishment of the State of Israel. Projects like Operation Magic Carpet, involving Ethiopian Jewry, and Operation Exodus, involving Russian Jewry, may serve as examples of Kibutz Galuyot in the recent past.

Whether you believe that Kibutz Galuyot means contemporary triumphs such as these, some future miracles, or both, it is a known fact that many Nevi'im prophesied about this great return to Israel. Yeshayah, Yirmiyah, and Yechezkel all prophesied about Kibutz Galuyot and how the Jews would one day return from all their dispersed locations in the Diaspora to cultivate the land, rebuild their society, and live according to the Torah. Another navi was involved in the first two events mentioned here, Kriat Yam Suf and Matan Torah. This navi was God's messenger to Pharaoh and the leader of B'nei Yisrael. He played a great role in getting the new nation to Israel, and he was instrumental every step of the way in the Midbar. His name, of course, was Moshe. So we see that in all the groundbreaking events mentioned here, nevi'im were involved in foreseeing them or in making them happen.

Many have observed that Yetzi'at Mitzrayim and the transformation of the Jews into a nation involved two major components; in order for God to redeem His nation completely, He had to redeem them from both physical bondage and from spiritual bondage. When observing these three specific events, it seems possible to apply this concept here as well, shedding more light on them. With the splitting of the Red Sea, God effectively cut the leash from the necks of the Jews, eliminating the Egyptian threat that would have returned them to the house of bondage. This can be seen as the final triumph in the physical redemption of B'nei Yisrael. But God knew that B'nei Yisrael would not be His nation completely until they would accept and learn the laws of the Torah. God needed to transform the slaves of B'nei Yisrael into B'nei Torah. This can be viewed as the spiritual redemption of the Jews that would make their Yetzi'ah from Mitzrayim truly complete. These two events are similar in that they both took place in the presence of the entire Am Yisrael and therefore served as turning points in our history.

Here, perhaps, we can recognize a pattern. God knew that he would have to give B'nei Yisrael the Torah to complete their religious transformation, but that first he would first have to *physically* redeem them from Pharaoh to get them to Har Sinai in the first place. Once at Sinai, B'nei Yisrael were freed from concerns about their enemies and ready for Matan Torah, a *spiritual* event. This is not the only time that God brings about a physical turning point before a spiritual one. The third great event mentioned above, Kibutz Galuyot, is occurring and b'ezrat Hashem will continue to occur before the eyes of the entire world. The world was listening when the UN vote was taken that would make 1948 a miraculous year on the Jewish calendar. A certain nevu'ah may, perhaps, act as an example of the physical – spiritual pattern as well. According to Yechezkel's nevu'ah of the Valley of Dry Bones, the bones first reconnect and transform into bodies. They then come back to life and return to the land of Israel. They are enveloped with a new "ruach" and a stronger will to serve God. So we see how physical renewal is necessary for this nevu'ah to begin to foretell the spiritual renewal.

Once Kibutz Galuyot is completed, the emerging pattern will also be completed with the coming of the Mashiach. In other words, once the Jews are returned safely to their land and filled with a reviving spirit, then God will send Eliyahu to us with the Mashiach. B'ezrat Hashem, Bi'at HaMashiach will be the spiritual climax to follow the physical ingathering of the exiles.

So we see how nevi'im are involved in bringing about the turning points in the Jewish world. From Moshe to Yeshayahu, Yirmiyahu and Yechezkel, and finally to Eliyahu's awaited return, nevi'im have affected and will affect the lives of B'nei Yisrael. Hashem successfully redeemed our bodies and our souls from Egypt. Hopefully, the events since 1948 and the aliyot of the future will bring the Mashiach very soon.

PARSHAT SHOFTIM

Devarim 17:15 states: PIGE IS TOPI TELE PEN PIER DIE DIE THE Torah commands us to place a king upon ourselves, the one that Hashem shall choose. Then the Torah warns us king pok is the tele in the Torah warns us king pok is not of our people to be our king. Such was indeed the practice in some ancient Near Eastern nations, and the Torah here warns us against this.

Ramban asks a question on this possuk. Why, if <u>Hashem</u> chooses our king are <u>we</u> told not to appoint an '''' ? The choice isn't ours to make in the first place! Ramban answers that, although Hashem would choose some of our first kings (Shaul, David, Yeravam), the Torah anticipated that a time would come that <u>we</u> would choose our kings. At such a time, we are warned to be sure that our choice would be one with Hashem's. This, Ramban says, is the Torah's way of telling the human being to use his or her free will in making choices consistent with Hashem's will. The first possuk in last week's parsha already made this abundantly clear. The decision whether life is a parsha or a
