

Perception Is Nine Tenths of the Flaw

Perception is nine tenths of the flaw: If you think about any painful problem you've ever experienced in life, or more specifically - in camp, you can probably trace a common thread through each and every case. As I see it, misunderstandings are almost always behind our roughest times. People hurt each other and themselves with words and deeds and pull themselves away from G-d only by misunderstanding reality.

Before they are from the tree of good and evil, Adam and Eve inhabited a world consisting solely of truth and falsehood. The consequence of their mistake was the introduction to the human experience of the subjectivity, which we live with today. And what led to their first mistake was misperception regarding the exact nature of G-d's words regarding the Eitz HaDa'at.

In recent parshiot we have read about misunderstandings and misperceptions: the questioning of Aharon, the criticism of Moshe, the complaints about the "mon", the meraglim and Korach all are can be traced to misconceptions and misperceptions.

Chukat follows these stories. And it brings a very deep message which addresses the question of perception. The Para Aduma is famous for its paradox of purifying the impure while making the pure impure. It is also famous for confounding the wisest of men, even Shlomo HaMelech.

Rav Yochanan ben Zachai was asked about the meaning of this mitzva. A close look exposes a profound exposition on the point of this mitzva: "Chayechem! It is not the dead that makes tamei, it is not the water nor the cow that causes tahara. Rather, Hashem says 'Chuka Chakakti, Gezeira gazarti. You are not permitted to transgress My decree', as it is stated: 'This is the Chok of the Torah'."

Rav Yochanan's response is communicating a basic principle of Torah thought: Human emotions and experience in life are judged objectively only by G-d. What R. Yochanan expressed was that the paradox inherent in this mitzva alludes to the Divine Harmony which makes sense out of these contradictions. And someone whose world is only physical, and lacking a spiritual component, will never understand this.

Things only make real sense when understood in a Divine context. The stories we mentioned are all preceded by the establishment of a camp with G-d in its center. When that message was forgotten the Para came to set the record straight.

In our camp this summer, may we be blessed to always keep Hashem at the center. Then we will surely succeed in perceiving things as they are, and fulfill our life's goal of growing constantly closer to G-d.


