

What's New In the Big Wide World?

A skull discovered in central Africa may belong to the earliest known member of the human family. At almost seven million years old, the skull is, according to scientists, the oldest example of a pre-human ancestor that walked upright.

D'var Torah By Rabbi Joel Cohn

This Shabbat we read of the pleas of Moshe Rabbeinu to Hashen to allow him to enter Eretz Yisrael. We are all familiar with the Chazal that explains that Moshe wanted to enter Eretz Yisrael in order to fulfill those mitzvot that can only be done there. Yet, Hashem refused the request and Moshe was only allowed to see the-Land of Israel from atop Har Nevo.

Rav Soloveitchik, z'tl, pointed out that the word "va'etchanan" is written in the singular — "and I pleaded." The Rav remarked that part of the tragedy of Moshe Rabbeinu was that he was the only one who davened on his behalf. There were no mass tefila gatherings, no one else lifted their head skyward to beg for Hashem it was Moshe alone

We can assume that the kahal felt unworthy to pray for Moshe, that if Moshe's tefila went unheaded, certainly their's would as well. Who knows what Hashem's reaction might have been had He seen all of Klal Yisrael joining Moshe in his davening. 5. Who had already been buried in Eretz

As we seek nechama and the building of the third Beit Hamikdash, we must join all of Klal Yisrael in tefila. Every voice counts, every word counts. Perhaps this will be the year in which Hashem sees us all joined together in prayer and can no longer refuse our request.

Ideas on Israel

The Meshech Chochma, in his commentary on Parshat Bechukotai, comments that a pattern exists throughout Jewish history and that exists in a three-part cycle. First, Jewish pioneers build a strong Jewish establishment and pour their sweat and blood into a land. These pioneers erect communal structures and work hard to secure their children's future. The second generation begins to forget about the toils of their parents and begins to become compla-

cent. The third generation totally destroyed and the survivors are left to begin the cycle anew. Interestingly, the *Meshech Chochma* wrote this before the Holocaust and said then that the next destruction would be in Berlin.

We are in the midst of this cycle todayin *Eretz Yisrael*. Our ancestors toiled endlessly to establish the Jewish nation in Israel. However, *Medinat Yisrael* was handed to our generation on a silver platter. We often take Israel for granted; it has always been there, so we don't doubt that it always will be. But, we cannot be passive and we cannot be complacent. It is up to us to make sure that this cycle is our last and that the third *Beit Hamikdash* will be rebuilt for eternity — before we are once again destroyed.
