#### This Week in the Parsha: מטות-מסעי

The Torah details for us the wanderings of Bnei Yisrael in the desert. It is Moshe who records the journeys as follows:

"ויכתב משה את מוצאיהם למסעיהם על פי ה' ואלה מסעיהם למוצאיהם."

At first glance the DNO seems oddly phrased and certainly a bit repetitive. Clearly we need to define the terms used to understand the lesson which the Torah wishes to impart.

מסעיהם implies your travels, where you are going to, while מוצאיהם terms where you have come from. Historically, we as a Jewish people have journeyed many places. We are most successful in maintaining our Jewish identity when we travel to our במוצאיהם via מוצאיהם the knowledge of our experiences from where we come, we can successfully navigate to where we are destined to go.

I believe the following story illustrates the point. A father and child set out together on a trip. In their knapsack they packed food and drink. Upon reaching the crossroads they are dismayed to see the sign which directed people to four different cities in four different directions, fallen to the ground and consequently of no use. At that point the child turns to the father and says, "We know where we came from and so we can put the sign back up with the arrow

pointing to our point of origin, and thus know to where we have to go."

When you know from where you come, your מוצא, you can be sure of where you have to go, your מטע.

All of us embark on a journey during the three weeks. We are coming from a אבות חנם of difficulty, שנאת חנם and sadness. It is our goal to reach a אהבת חנם, כבוד הבריות and happiness. We know where we are coming from and therefore understand where we must go! Through a sense of goodness and kindness to one another, and a genuine concern for our fellow Jew, we can take ourselves מיגון.
