

New to Camp Morasha - Boys and Girls Beit Midrash Programs



Welcome to God's living room!

A strange way to start a column in the Shalhavet, no? And a strange way to speak. But!

This summer's Camp Morasha theme is meant to help us appreciate *Hashem's* greatness not

only in *Torah* and *mitzvot*, but through the nature and the world He created as well. *Mah rabu ma'asekha Hashem* (How great are your creations, *Hashem!*) is just one of hundreds of *pesukim* that speak of how *Hashem's* greatness can be seen in nature. And the first of the *birkat Keriyat Sh'ma* reminds us of this twice a day.

So, as you leave your schools and shuls in the city, as you leave your houses and bedrooms and playrooms behind, don't think of camp as just a place to play ball, to be with friends, to learn some Torah and to swim in the lake, but think of the trees, grass, animals and lake as chances to understand parts of Hashem that we can't understand in the paved streets of the city.

It took Hashem six days to create the world, and the seventh day was Shabbat. We are at camp for seven weeks! So each week will be devoted to one day of creation.

Week One: Light and Darkness
Week Two: The Sky
Week Three: Trees and Flowers
Week Four: The Sun, Moon and Stars
Week Five: Fish and Birds
Week Six: Animals

Week Seven: Shabbat

We have all kinds of great and fun things planned during shiurim, arts and crafts, and night activities that will help us understand more about each day of creation and more about the world we live in.

It says in *Pirke Avot* 3:7, Rabbi Shimon said: If a person is walking on the road and learning *Torah* and interrupts the learning, and says, "How beautiful is this tree!" or "How great is this field!" he has committed a sin.

What kind of sin is this? And what's so wrong with admiring nature? Rabbi Lamm explained that the sin was not in admiring nature at all, but was being mafsik, thinking that appreciating nature is not a part of Torah. Now that doesn't mean that when we are sitting in shiurim or in the Beit Midrash that it's O.K. to space out and to stare out

the window! What it does mean is that we can find ways to appreciate *Torah* and to learn about *Hashem* not only in a *sefer*, but also in the clouds, the fields and the animals as well. Have a great summer!
