As you've most likely noticed over the this past week, every area of camp has something new and exciting to boast about. So here's a look at:

#### What's new in camp this year?

Perhaps the most exciting addition to the daily schedule is horseback riding. Headed up by Art Jones, this new activity can be found out by the former overnight sight. Art and his staff will be teaching the fundamentals of riding including



steering, stopping, and riding. The riders will first ride in a circle and once both the horses and the campers feel at home, the will begin to ride on a track where one horse follows the other. For those of you who are nervous, Art assures me that all the horses are aged horses and know how to follow. Staff is always welcome to stop by and try this new activity.

New to the *music* department this year is Rebecca Teplow, a talented woman with a beautiful singing voice. The music staff has been busy this past week working with the campuses to prepare for shiriah. This year, shirah's theme is *chazak ameinu*. Each campus will perform 2 traditional songs and one Israeli song followed by a finale where everyone in the room will sing a song relating to the theme. If the actual performances are as good as the practices, we are all in for a real treat.

The *library* is open and will be starting book clubs that will meet twice throughout the summer to discuss predetermined books. Over the winter, the library has made some wonderful new acquisitions including many new seforim and judaica books, current novels, childrens' selections and an audio tape library with tapes of shiurim from Rabbi Yissochar Frand and Rabbi Akiva Tatz, among others. Stop by the library any time to pick up a copy of the *Spiderwick Chronicles*, *The Guinness Book of World Records*, *Chicken Soup for the Horse Lover's Soul* or writings of Rav Soleveitchik.

This year's *mishlachat* from *Eretz Yisrael* contains 21 young men and women who are here to open the lines of communication between Americans and Israelis, foster understanding and "break down walls". They will be giving *sichot* on *Shab*-



bos, providing an "Israel Minute" after davening, announcing Israeli news and playing Israeli music over the loudspeakers, maintaining an Israeli bulletin board in the dining room, setting up "military games" night activities and are planning an "Israel Day Event" involving the whole camp.

The staff of Boys' and Girls' **sports** are eagerly anticipating the Wayne County Athletic Association tournaments for basketball and tennis. Judah Rhine will be coordinating this event where campers in Shtilim through Alufim/fot can compete against campers from all the other camps in Wayne County. Boys' campus boasts the addition of two new basketball courts while girls campus has acquired a trampoline which will be up and running in the next few days. For the boys who couldn't get enough sports, there will be night leagues in addition to the daytime ones. Alufot girls can look forward to Friday afternoon tennis tournaments.

Paddleboats are one exciting addition to the waterfronts on both campuses. Boys WF has already inaugurated their new ski

dock which, in addition to the fixed motor boat, will enable more campers to participate in this thrilling activity. Boys WF will also be running a new lifeguarding course for alufim, machon and staff.

With a host of new young, talented staff and curricula prepared by the Azrieli School of Jewish Education of Yeshiva University, the **educational staff** is raring to go! Shiurim this summer will focus on the

### THE TUILIE

Theme: Day 2: The Rakiyah

Breishit 1:6-8:

And God said, Let there be a firmament in the midst of the waters, and let it divide the waters from the waters. And God made the firmament, and divided the waters which were under the firmament from the waters which were above

the firmament; and it was so. And God called the firmament Heaven. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

On the second day of creation, Hashem created the Rakiyah-- the firmament, or the atmosmoshere, that separates the earth from the Heavens. The Yismach Moshe asks why it is that we don't call the

sky Rakiyah, after its function (what it does), but instead we call it Shamayim, because of what it is made of, eish (fire) and mayim (water). He answers that we can learn an important lesson from this about life and friends...and camp. This is the important reason: rakiyah is all about separation and division and shamayim is about

shalom and unity.

Here's how it goes: In explaining the words "Oseh Shalom Bimromav," "May He who makes peace in the heavens, make peace for us", the Midrash explains that the shamayim is composed of two contradictory elements and is a contraction of two words: eish (fire) and mayim (water). This is how they understood how the sun and stars and lightening could get along

with rain. The greatness of God's efforts is in maintaining balance and tolerance between these two opposing elements. The heavenly waters do not extinguish the sun, and the sun does not harm the waters. So, in our prayers, we ask for God's help in creating such tolerance and coexistence in our own lives, with our families and our friends.

So, welcome to Week 2 of Camp Morasha. This week, the lesson from our summer theme is: Some of us may be eish (fire) and some of us may be mayim (water), but we have the right formula that when combined with respect and understanding creates our own little corner of shamayim right here at Morasha!

# BMPMMP - New to the Morasha Alphabet Soup

These buildings stand out wherever they are. On boys' campus, it's the new building in the center of the campus. On girls' campus its even harder to miss, you'd even know it was there if you closed your eyes and listened to the hammering and sawing. What are these buildings you ask? They are the new batei medrash, home and future home to the Boys' Beis Medrash Program (BMP) and the Girls' Midreshet Morasha Program (MMP).

These programs are yet another new addition to Camp Morasha this summer. The girls' Midreshet Morasha Program is temporarily located in Bondi 2 while construction of their beautiful new building is completed. The program consists of 16 college-age young women who are graduates of Michlalah, Michlelet Mevaseret Yerushalayim and Midreshet Lindenbaum. Some of the girls are planning a future career in Jewish education. Midreshet Morasha's Rosh Beit Midrash is Anne Gordon, an experienced teacher currently teaching in Yeshiva of Flatbush and Stern College for Women. She will be teaching tanach and machshava as one part of a three part Rabbi Azriel Rosner and Rabbi Zvi Sobolofsky will be teaching halacha. Talia Frolich and Elana Stein will both be giving gemorah chaburas and shiurim.

The most exciting part about the Midreshet Morasha program, according to Elana Stein, Program Coodinator, is their widespread involvement with girls' campus. Alufot and Machon *chaburas* given by the members of the program are already underway as is an early morning Cocoa Club for Nitzanim and Shtilim. If you are in Ilanot, you will be privileged to hear 301 seconds of *Torah* and Yachad *chaburahs* will be beginning soon.

It doesn't stop there. Midreshet Morasha will also be hosting guest *shiurim* and open *charusa* night for staff (Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7:30-10:30 PM) and setting up *yimei iyun* for various divisions. Look for an invitation to a Friday night *tisch* coming your way soon.

The members of the program are thrilled to be in Morasha this summer and are excited about being a part of everything that's going on in camp. They even performed in the girls' campus Opening Night program. They can't wait to have all of girls' campus join them in a big chanukas habayit when their new building is complete.


On the other side of the camp, the boys' beis medrash is also full of young men, dedicated to the learning of *Torah*. The Beis Medrash program is thrilled to have Rabbi Zvi Sobolofsky as the *Rosh Beis Medrash*. Rabbi Sobolofsky is a *Rosh Yeshiva* in Yeshiva University and gives shiurim throughout the tri-state area. It is a true *z'chus* to have this tremendous *talmid chacham* in camp this summer.

The boys have a morning seder at which point they prepare for shiur, given by Rabbi Sobolofsky three times a week. They are learning gemorah shabbos, inyanei bris milah. One day each week they hope to have a guest shiur from a renowned Torah scholar. They learn b'chavrusah for afternoon and night seder as well.

The BMP guys are excited to be a part of boys' campus. They are davening shacharis with the camper minyanim, conducting chaburahs with Machon and learning with the Alufim. In addition, they will also be hosting staff shiurim at night. Pre-shacharis learning with the llanot is also in the works. Yehuda Chanales, BMP Program Coordinator, thinks this is the best part of the program; they have the ability to learn with the campers as well as join them in the dining room and on the basketball courts. Yehuda invites all of boys' campus to stop by the beis medrash or the mirpeset (the beis medrash porch) anytime.

If you haven't met a member of the either the girls or boys program yet, make sure to stop by and introduce yourself. They look forward to meeting and learning with each and every camper in camp!

A tremendous yasher ko'ach to the camp administration for initiating these new and inspiring programs. Hopefully we will all learn and grow a great deal from their presence in camp this summer.

This week we are introduced to the navi Bil'am. Although Bil'am is a prophet whose job it is to spread the words of Hashem, he is referred to by Chaza"I as Bil'am harasha, the evil man. Rashi explains that Bil'am was not necessarily worthy of receiving prophecy, rather he was a gift to the nations of the world. Since the b'nei visrael had Moshe rabbeinu, it was only fair that the other nations be given a navi of their own. However, Bil'am did not use this gift in order to guide the nations of the world in the service of Hashem, rather he became corrupt, seeking to glorify himself and his own position in life. When Balak's men return to Bil'am a second time and ask him to curse the Jewish people, Bil'am replies, (Bamidbar 22:18): "Even if Balak would give me all of his money, I would not be able to violate the word of Hashem." On the surface, this seems like a very pious and committed statement. However, Rashi points out that the very fact that Bil'am uses such an exaggeration demonstrates that his mind was not steeped in holy matters, rather it was thinking about making a greater profit. Bil'am assumes that riches are the greatest gift that Balak could give him, and in this he shows his true colors. A spiritual man knows that while he requires proper sustenance in order to survive, his money is only a means to serving Hashem, not an end in and of itself.

A story is told about a man who lived in *B'nei Brak* who won the Israeli lottery. He used that money to build a bigger house and to purchase a fancy car along with various other luxuries. His wife, upon realizing that their new standard of living had the potential to evoke feelings of jealousy from their neighbors, recommended

that her husband obtain a blessing from Rav Chaim Kanievsky in order to ward off any potential aiyin harah. The man visited Rav Chaim, explained his situation, and asked for his blessing. Rav Chaim looked at the man and asked him: "Since acquiring your newfound wealth, have you been able to spend more time learning Torah than you did before?"

"No", the man replied, "The money has not been enough to allow me to work fewer hours, simply to raise my standard of living."

"Have you been able to in any way enhance your shmirat hamitzvot since obtaining these funds?" continued Rav Chaim.

"I haven't," answered the man, "I really haven't had any extra time."

"Then you may go home and tell your wife that you have nothing to fear from aiyin harah. I don't see why anyone in B'nei Brak would be jealous of you," concluded Rav Chaim.

Hopefully, we will all learn the lesson of Bil'am and use the gifts that *Hashem* bestows upon us for spiritual matters, and to further our devotion to His service.
