delivered daily, but remember boys, no tzitzit, no sports. Stop by and visit to check out the seforim, adult and childrens' books, magazines and Torah tape library.



What's New In the Real World?

Governor Pataki and Mayor Bloomberg unveiled a radical redesign of the Freedom Tower planned in Lower Manhattan on Wednesday: a 77-story glass-clad skyscraper that would sit atop an almost impermeable 200-foot concrete and steel pedestal, overlooking the memorial intended to honor those who died at the World Trade Center.

A fish as big as a bear was caught by villagers in northern Thailand, according to a report released yesterday. The 646-pound Mekong giant catfish, caught last month, is believed to be the largest freshwater fish ever seen.

Imagine having 200,000 bees covering your body—and *still* not setting a world record! Philip McCabe of Tipperary, Ireland, was aiming for the world mark of 350,000 bees (a staggering 87 1/2 pounds), but fell about 150,000 bees short. McCabe said that had it been warmer than 63 degrees, the bees would have followed their docile queen, which rested on his chin.

At the beginning of this week's parsha, we read the story of Korach's rebellion against Moshe Rabbeinu. Korach's lineage was similar to that of Moshe and Aharon and he therefore felt that he should be entitled to a similar position of leadership. He therefore joined forces with others who felt that they had been ignored and should have been given more significant roles to play in the hierarchy of the b'nei Yisrael, and together, they set out to prove their point. However, had their true motives been apparent to the masses, no one would have taken their rebellion seriously and they would have been written off as "power hungry". Thus Korach devised a plan that would help him gain sympathy among the masses.

Rashi, citing the *medrash*, explains that he gathered 250 leaders, mostly from *shevet* Reuven, and cloaked them in garments comprised completely of *t'chelet*. He brought this imposing group before Moshe and asked him whether these garments required *tzitzit*. Moshe answered that they indeed did need to be adorned with *tzitzit*, and Korach began to laugh at him. His reasoning was simple. If the entire goal of wearing *tzitzit* is so that one will see a single strand of *t'chelet*, why should a garment that composed of thousands of *t;chelet* strands not be exempt? Korach's goal in staging this spectacle was to discredit Moshe as a Torah leader. If Moshe was truly

Hashem's choice as the ultamite teacher of Torah, how could he have made such an obvious mistake in *halacha*; one which is apparent to anyone who analyzes the situation. Thus it seemed clear that Moshe was not Hashem's choice to be the only leader of the *b'nei Yisrael*, and he had simply usurped the power for himself.

We are all aware that Korach was indeed mistaken, but the question is why? Why wasn't his argument just as valid as Moshe Rabbeinu's? After all, logic seems to be on his side, and the garment should not need to be adorned with tzitzit? Rav Yosef Dov Soloveitchik explains that the root of Korach's error was that he thought that Torah was a discipline that could be understood by anyone possessing a keen and intelligent mind. If one is capable of thinking in a logical fashion, then their arguments bear as much weight as those of a seasoned Torah scholar. This is, however, not the case at all. Just as every type of science has its rules of study. and must be analyzed using a thorough knowledge of the subject, so too Torah is a discipline that is governed by its own rules and Godly logic. If someone visits the doctor and is diagnosed with a particular ailment. they would be foolish to waste their time explaining to the doctor why it is logically impossible that they might have contracted this disease. Logic has nothing to do with it. The tests, which are governed by their own biological and chemical rules have determined the scientific reality, to which everyday logic plays little or no role. The same is true for Torah and halacha. A great scholar, one capable of paskening halachot, must train himself
