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What's New in Camp?

President Bush nominated U.S. Court of Appeals Judge John G. Roberts Jr. for the Supreme Court, passing over several female candidates to replace the retiring Justice Sandra Day O'Connor in favor of a well-regarded litigator with conservative credentials and friends in both parties.

"Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince" sold about 9 million copies in the United States and England on its first day alone. The one day total is higher than most books ever achieve. The only other book to come close to this number was the fifth Harry Potter book, "The Order of the Phoenix." Reviews of the books were mixed. Some critics felt it was Rowling's best and others found it to be repetitious reminding them of her earlier books.

What's New in Israel?

A number of buses with anti-pullout protestors left Kfar Maimon late Wednesday and headed home, but the majority of the tens of thousands of demonstrators remained at the site. Earlier, Southern District police chief Commander Uri Bar-Lev rejected the latest pleas from settler leaders to open the gates to allow the demonstrators who have been there since Monday to march towards Gush Katif.

Pro-disengagement activists plan to spread across approximately 200 junctions throughout Israel to hand out blue and white ribbons, countering the ongoing orange anti-disengagement campaign.

Foreign Minister Silvan Shalom warned that Palestinian terrorism could disrupt the disengagement. He said that although the process would be "more complicated" if terror continued; the Israeli government plans to still carry out the plan.

What's New in Sports?

Tino Martinez and Jason Giambi each hit two of New York's six homers to help back a strong effort by Aaron Small in the Yankees' 8-4 win over Texas on Wednesday. Robinson Cano and Jorge Posada also went deep for the Bombers in the win. The Yankees stand half a game behind Boston in the American League East.

Carlos Beltran and Mike Piazza of the Mets hit homers in Wednesday's 7-3 win, Piazza's tying Johnny Bench's all-time total. This is the Mets' third straight win, leaving them five and a half games behind the Nationals.

After we read about Pinchas's heroic act, the Torah begins to take a count of all the people. The reason for this counting, according to Rashi, was that just like a shepherd counts his flock after it has been ravaged by wolves, Hashem wanted to count his children who had survived the plague.

In Bamidbar 26:42-43, we are told that the shevet, tribe of Dan totaled 64,400. The shevet of Binyamin totaled 45,600. The Chofetz Chaim points out that Binyamin had ten sons, while his brother Dan only had one son, Chushim. Furthermore, what is even more amazing is that Chushim was handicapped; he was deaf. Although Dan had only one son, and Binyomin had ten, Dan had more descendants than Binyomin.

Said the Chofetz Chaim, if Hashem wants a person to be successful, he will succeed, even if it appears at first that he has less than someone else. It is possible that from one son came more descendants than from ten.

The same is true with regard to wealth and our possessions. As it states in *Pirkei Avot perek* 4 mishna 1, "Who is rich, one who is happy with what he has been given." If one would strive to live his or her life with happiness for all that he has and not concern himself with what his friends have, how wonderful such a life would be.

This is something we should all strive for. Especially now as the three weeks are about to begin, if we would serve *Hashem* with *simcha* and thanks for all that He has given us, then, *im yirtzeh Hashem* we will celebrate *Tisha B'Av* as a *Yom Tov* in *Yerushalayim*, and not as a day of mourning and sadness.



As the first month spills into the second, so the theme of the first month steps aside for the new theme for next month. Over the course of this last full week of the first session of camp, many of the campers learned about the importance of cooperation and initiative within a community. As you have seen, the recycling bins (at least on girls' campus) are centrally located and are soon to be adorned with recycling stickers created by the campers themselves. Additionally, in their BMP periods (the out-of-the-box activities offered to Shtill and Ilanot girls, and hopefully to boys as well in the coming month), the girls learned about communication through a newly created game, in which teammates rely on one another in order to accomplish goals.

To give you a taste of what is to come, beginning next week, the IEP looks forward to re-energizing the informal program in Morasha, starting with dinner on opening night. There will be a short video to introduce the new theme, and IEP plans to expand its activities beyond the BMP activities for girls and Shabbat afternoon programs for both Machzor Aleph and Machzor Bet.
