## Camp Morasha's Annual Blood Drive



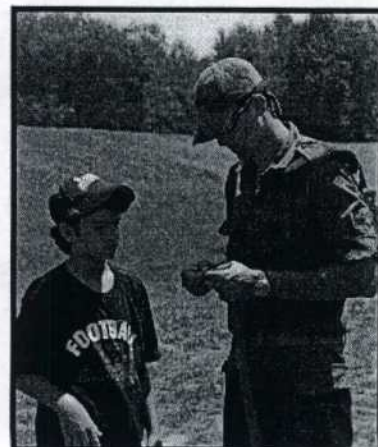
Blood, it's in you to give!

## Shtilim Boys



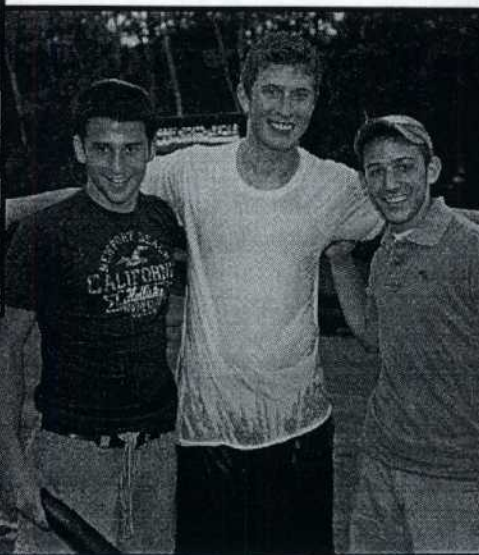
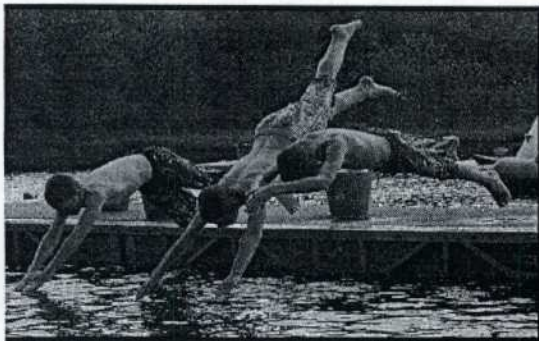

## Dvar Torah

In one of this week's parsha's, parshas mattos, Bnei yisrael is commanded to go to war against midian. Bnei Yisrael is commanded to take 1,000 soldiers from each tribe to serve in the army. The Torah formulates the designation of the soldiers in an unusual formulation. In perek 31 pasuk 5 the torah says V'yimsaru m'alphei yisrael. Why does the Torah use a loшон of masar, which seems to suggest passivity and reluctance on the part of bnei yisrael to go to war. Why does it seem that bnei yisrael were reluctant to go to war? Rashi quoting the midrash gives a fascinating explanation.

The Midrash explains that the torah is telling us the praise of the moshe. How? The Midrash relates that before bnei yisrael knew that moshe was going to die and not deliver them into eretz yisrael, they often criticized moshe and his leadership skills, so much so that moshe once said od Miat u'skaluni [a little bit more and they will stone me]. But once they found out that moshe was going to die right before they entered Eretz Yisrael, they tried to prolong his death by not going to war because of their love for moshe Rabbeinu. That is why the pasuk uses a loшон of passivity because they had to be forced to go to war so that moshe would live longer.

This is a beautiful midrash, but we can ask one question. Why does the midrash need to tell us that bnei yisrael once hated moshe? How does that show bnei yisrael's love for moshe rabbeinu?

I think one answer to this question is a very well known idea, but one that many don't often remember. All too often we go through experiences without taking a moment to stop and think about what we are doing. We can go through a whole summer without ever taking time to reflect on life, our relationships, and our goals. Then when the summer is over we regret not spending more time with our new friends, or working on our goals. Only after the experience do we realize how lucky we were to have the opportunities we had, or to have been friends with the people we met. In order to avoid this all too common experience of regret, it is important to devote some time to just be alone and think about what you are doing and why so as to maximize the opportunities in front of you and to appreciate what you have. We see this phenomenon in the aforementioned midrash.

Bnei yisrael had a complex relationship with moshe. Moshe often challenged bnei yisrael to rise above themselves and their complaints, and often he criticized them when he saw necessary. Consequently, as with any good leader, there was tension between moshe and bnei yisrael, comparable to the tension that sometimes exists between a parent and their children. However, this never meant that Bnei Yisrael hated moshe, just as a fight between a parent and a child doesn't indicate enmity in that relationship. Rather the arguments and the tension are a part of life.

Bnei Yisrael loved Moshe all along, but just never realized it until they were given the gift of the knowledge of moshe's impending death. Because they knew that moshe was going to die they were forced to reflect on their relationship with moshe, and they realized that although there were intense arguments and fights they couldn't fathom life without moshe. That shows the true chavivus of a leader, one who is able to challenge his people without losing their love. One can even suggest that the challenges to grow is one reason why bnei yisrael came to love and respect Moshe Rabbeinu.

The message is clear. About now is the half-way point of the summer. Everyday we have many activities that consume us, but don't leave much time for personal reflection. With this in mind it is important to try to take a step back and think about what we have accomplished this summer and what we want to accomplish in the second month. Are there relationships that we have neglected and can work on better? Are there aspects of our characters that we would like to work on? The time to think is now because soon we won't realize it, but the summer will be over. Good Shabbos.





## Girl's BMP (AKA GMP)

It sure is hard to be a "good kid" nowadays- you never know who to please first and how to get on their good side! Moshe Rabeinu understood this challenge and us some guidance in this week's Parsha.

The tribes of Reuven, Gad, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  Menashe came before Moshe with a request. They wanted to settle on the opposite side of the Yarden, and not enter Eretz Yisrael; this side had better land for their animals, and it would truly help them out economically.

While Moshe was initially disturbed by this request, he did understand their reasoning, and gave them permission to settle there- on one condition! When Bnei Yisrael go to war against the nations of Canaan, to conquer it, the  $2\frac{1}{2}$  shevatim cannot just sit back on the other side of the Yarden – they must go out with the rest of the Jewish nation, and help them fight for Eretz Yisrael. Once they do heed this condition, Moshe said, they will then be "pure and guiltless in the eyes of Hashem, and in the eyes of the Jewish people" (Bamidbar 32:22). Meaning, not only will Hashem be okay with their plan to live across the Yarden, but all of Klal Yisrael will think of them as "pure and guiltless" as well.

Bnei Yisrael might have thought that the shevatim of Reuven, Gad, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  Menashe were trying to split from the nation- but once these tribes promise to remain with their fellow Jewish brothers and fight with them and care about them, then everyone- Hashem and the Jewish Nation, will be understanding of these  $2\frac{1}{2}$  tribes.

Moshe taught these tribes, and us, that not only is it important to do what Hashem knows is right, not only what make G-d happy, but what will please other people as well.

The Mishna in Pirkei Avot tells us that we must choose a path of religious service that brings glory and acceptance both from Hashem and man-  
"Kol Shehi tiferet le'ose, v'tiferet lo min haadam" (2:1)

As discussed in the BMP sponsored "spiritual training" sessions in this week's Olympics- being a religious Jew do not only encompass our actions in shul and in shiur, but also on the courts, in our bunks, and with our counselors, teachers, and friends.

B'ezrat Hashem, the lessons we learn from Moshe Rabbeinu, the Olympics, and our improvement in our Mitzvoth bein adam l'chaveiro should help bring the geula closer Bimhaira Byameinu!

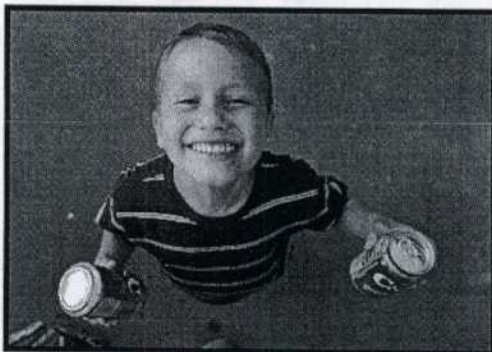
## Day Camp News
