
bragging rights... until next year! It's hard to believe that visiting day is here already!

### DVAR TORAH from RABBI YEHUDA BALSAM

The events surrounding this week's parsha contain two very unique incidents. When Pinchas committed his famous life-saving act of zealotry, he stopped a plague that had already taken 24,000 lives. It was an event beneficial to people of the time, and it taught us a lesson for our period as well. However, one question that jumps out at us when we read about this incident is, where was Moshe Rabeinu? Why didn't he take action the way Pinchas did? Surely if it was a question of knowledge of the halacha, Moshe was the greatest Torah scholar of all time. If it was a question of revelation, Moshe was the greatest Navi of all time. Why, then, did he not take the appropriate action as his student Pinchas did?

Rashi tells us that Moshe forgot the halacha concerning this matter. He explains that surely Moshe did not lack the intensity or the gumption to act, for he stood up before the entire nation when it worshipped the Eigel HaZahav and smashed the Luchot. Rather, Hashem hid the halacha from him so that Pinchas could come and claim his portion in the Torah. Pinchas approached Moshe and asked him, "Have you not taught us that in such a case a zealot can take action"? Moshe, who until this point had forgotten the halacha, now remembered it, and told Pinchas, "He who reads the letter should be the messenger in carrying out its contents". Immediately Pinchas set out to perform his mitzvah.

Similarly, we find the incident with the B'not Tzlafchad, whose great love for the land of Israel drove them to approach Moshe and request a portion in the land in place of their father's. Moshe, in his humility, did not even attempt to answer their question, but rather presented it to Hashem and awaited the answer. Here, too, Rashi comments that the halacha became hidden from Moshe because Hashem wanted the daughters of Tzlafchad to be the ones who received credit for teaching these halachot to the Bnei Yisrael. Due to their initiative and willingness to step outside their comfort zones for the sake of receiving a chelek in the holy land, they were rewarded for all time, becoming teachers of halacha to the entire Jewish population.

In both instances, Hashem prevented Moshe Rabeinu, the greatest teacher and scholar of all time, from being the one to transmit these halachot because He wanted to leave the opportunity for others to do so. This concept is often referred to as "makom hanicho lo," a place has been left open for him. Although we assume that the scholars of earlier generations were far greater than we, that should never prevent us from trying to master and add our original insights and perspectives to the Torah. Every Jew, no matter how gifted, scholarly or skilled, has something that only he or she can add to Hashem's Torah. The Zohar HaKadosh tells us that there are 600,000 letters in the Torah, one for every Jew. This means to say that every Jew has a portion in the Torah that only he or she can 'write'. A Torah that's missing even one letter is unusable, and it is our job to make sure that our letter is filled in beautifully and brightly. Hopefully we can take the lesson of Pinchas and the B'not Tzlafchad and achieve our chelek in Torah, as slowly but surely the sefer Torah that represents Am Yisrael becomes filled with our letters.

#### BOYS BMP by Yechiel Schwab and Shlomo Friedman:

This week was the MOST AMAZING, GREATEST WEEK in BMP history! Starting on Motzei Shabbos with the Morasha Cup (the most fantabulous ever) where Rotty, a BMP Division Head, uncharacteristically didn't quit and led his to victory, as the staff and campers not chosen in the random lottery sat and watched.
