Parshat HaShavuah

Parshat V'Etchanan

Sefer Devarim, the fifth book of the Torah, is a collection of speeches that Moshe gave to the Jewish people before they crossed the Jordan River into the Land of Israel. Moshe, who led them tirelessly throughout their sojourn in the desert, is unable to lead the nation into Israel. Moshe constantly reminds the nation of his sorry fate in the beginning chapters of Sefer Devarim (1:37, 3:26, and 4:21). In these speeches Moshe conveys important messages and mitzvot that the nation will need to remember and keep for their survival in the land of Israel.



Parshat V'Etchanan acts as an important bridge in Sefer

Devarim. In Parshat V'Etchanan Moshe finishes his first speech and then immediately begins his second and largest speech. The first speech is commonly referred to as the historical speech. In his opening remarks Moshe retells stories that occurred to the nation for them to learn valuable lessons. The second speech in contrast to the first speech does not contain many stories but rather lists many mitzvot that the nation must keep.

What is the connection between the end of the historical speech and the mitzvah speech? Rav Mordechai Saboto highlights two pesukim to demonstrate the purpose of each speech. (Devarim 4:1 and 5:1)

4:1 and 5:1 at first glance appear to almost identical pesukim. Both verses speak about listening to the laws and keeping these laws. The only difference seems to be that 4:1 is found at the conclusion of the first speech while 5:1 is the beginning of the second speech. However upon closer examination of these two verses a small yet important difference can be seen. 4:1 states *shema el* whereas 5:1 states *shema et*. Both phrases can be translated roughly as "listen to." However one can distinguish between their connotations. At the end of first speech Moshe hopes that the Jews, fueled by their inspiring relationship and history with G-d, will listen and obey the mitzvot. *Shema el* implies obeying the laws. On the other hand, in the second speech Moshe begins that the Jews should hear the laws and listen to their particulars. *Shema et* entails listening to the specific laws. In sum, the first speech explains **why** one should keep the mitzvot while the second explains the **content** of these mitzvot.

We can learn from Moshe's speeches and his careful organization that it is imperative, first to inspire others about why keeping Torah is important and subsequently to teach them about the specifics. We can live in Moshe's footsteps by being positive role models. If we are passionate about keeping mitzvot we will teach others by example about the enriching and ennobling nature of a Torah observant lifestyle.
