#### **DVAR TORAH by R' Moshe Dechter:**

In this week's Sedrah, the Torah introduces the famous process of parah aduma, the Red Heifer. The phrase used to introduce this special mitzvah is "zos chukkas haTorah." A chok is a mitzvah commanded by Hashem with no logical reason given. In the case of the red heifer, it is the process which is extremely puzzling. A person who

becomes tamei mait, contaminated by a dead body, is required to be m'taheir, purified, through this process. The chok aspect is regarding the Kohen who performs the ritual. Shockingly, he becomes tamei at the completion of the service!

The poskim ask an obvious question: Why is **this** mitzvah specifically referred to as "zos **chukkas haTorah**?" Perhaps a better wording would been "zos chukkas ha'para" or "zos chukkas ha'tehorah."

Rav Moshe Feinstein writes a beautiful answer in his sefer "Dorash Moshe." He explains that the term "chukkas haTorah" teaches us to keep every mitzvah in the Torah as a chok. Ideally, we should be keeping all mitzvot in the Torah only because Hashem commanded! My Rebbe, Rav Beinish Ginsburg of Yeshivat Netiv Aryeh, says that the reasons behind mitzvot should be the dessert: they should only enhance our observance of the mitzvot. We should be doing mitzvot because Hashem told us to! The fact that He gave us a reason should just make them more enjoyable. Rav Moshe adds a second idea as well: The peculiar process where the contaminated is purified, while the purifier is contaminated, actually teaches us an important life lesson. There are character traits that can be used both for purity and impurity. The same trait can bring someone close to Hashem or push him further away.

For example, this summer's theme is "live to give." The trait of generosity is usually a positive attribute. When a person calculates his income, he is supposed to give a tenth or more to tzedakah. The more you give, the bigger the mitzvah! However, when it comes to using a friend's money, one must be very stingy. Using one penny without his permission is seen as taking his friend's life! Therefore, being too generous with other's possessions can be detrimental to our religious observance.

"Zos chukkas haTorah" is a lesson on how we should strive to act every day. The Torah was given as a way to connect to Hashem and everything in it can be used to achieve greatness or chas vshalom to encourage immorality. It is our responsibility to act as nation of spiritual purity and accomplish the most important task of getting close to Hashem.
