PARSHAT DEVARIM:

In (דברים א: כ"ב) Moshe reminds the Bnei Yisrael of the incident of the spies “ All of you approached me and said, ‘Let us send people before us to scout the land...’ And it was good in my eyes and I took twelve people, one from each tribe”.

In (דברים ה: י"ט) Moshe recounts the giving of the Torah saying, “And it was when you heard the sound from the midst of the darkness and the mountain (Har Sinai) consumed in fire; And you approached me, the heads of the tribes and the elders”.

In this Parsha, Rashi compares and contrasts these two episodes where Moshe is approached, once prior to receiving the Torah and once prior to entering the land of Israel – two events that are central to the fulfillment of Hashem’s promise to the Avot. Indeed the sequence of events is clearly delineated in the beloved passage found in the Haggadah – Dayenu. The Jews are to receive the Torah, which is to serve as the blueprint to the daily life of Bnei Yisrael when they enter the land and begin their normal national existence.

Obviously, events of such national import will create apprehension for the people and it is only natural for them to approach their leader when the historical moment is upon them. This is a fact of human nature. The difference, Rashi points out, is how they approached Moshe. When the Torah was being given, the Jews came to Moshe in an organized manner, which reflected respect for the elders and the great people of the community. This approach is the model for Jewish life, which is based on reverence for those who transmit the Mesorah tradition. Yet when they were on the threshold of entering the land of Israel, “All of you approached me,” which Rashi describes as a chaotic mob. The children pushing the elders and the elders pushing the heads of the tribes. There is a total absence of Derech Eretz and this lack of Derech Eretz makes it impossible to enter the land of Israel.

This is why there is this reference at the beginning of Moshe’s rebuke to the Jewish people. Once again they stand at the threshold to the land of Israel. It is also no coincidence that this Parsha falls on the Shabbat prior to Tisha B’Av. The tragedy of Tisha B’Av stems from losing touch with Rashi’s lesson for us here. No Derech Eretz, no Torah and ultimately losing the land. However through a renewed embracement of Derech Eretz, the values that accompanied the giving of the Torah, we can then go over the threshold and receive the answer to our plea in Megillat Eichah;

השבנו ה' אליך ונשובה חדש ימינו כקדם.

-Rabbi Yitzchak Rosenblum
