כי את כל הארץ אשר אתה ראה לך אתננה ולזרעך עד עולם

All of the land, which you see, is given to you and your descendants forever. In פסוק ח, פרק מ, ישעיהו it says:

יבש חציר נבל ציץ ודבר

אלקינו יקום לעולם

The Midrash discusses the significance of these words in the form of a משל: There was a man, who was loved by a king and the King said to him, "walk with me and I will give you a present". The man went for a walk with the king and dies on the way. The king goes in search of the man's son and says to him that even

though his father died, I will not take back the present. I promised it to your father and therefore I want you to have it. This applies to the promise that Hashem made to Avraham: since Eretz Yisrael was promised to Avraham the promise is also passed down to future generations of **עם ישראל** after Avraham's death.

The **אבן עזרא** emphasizes that Eretz Yisrael was given "בדבור" in the form of a state of promise. The **רמב"ן** extends this idea and writes that it was given as a **מתנה** at the time of Avraham but meant for future generations. "כמו שאמרו רבותנו ירושה היא להם מאבותיהם"

After **ירמיהו** acquires Anatot for **חננאל** it says: "כה אמר ה' צבאות אלקי ישראל עוד יקנו בתים ושדות וכרמים בארץ הזאת"

Bnei Yisrael will inherit the land promised to Avraham and build a Jewish society in **ארץ ישראל**. It is clear that it is our job as descendants of Avraham, even at times that our ownership of Eretz Yisrael is challenged to remember that we are the **יורשים** of the land that was given to Avraham in the promise of "כי לך אתננה ולזרעך עד עולם".

Alufim/fot: Team Medina-

Try walking into the Strick Library on Erev Shabbat and go up to a young man or woman studying Gemarah. Ask them, "Why do you learn?" There are many answers from which to choose. One of the more common answers though is to bring myself closer to Hashem. As Jews living in the Diaspora, we experienced first hand being taken away from Hashem. Although we live quite comfortably in America, we know in our hearts that we belong across the ocean in Eretz Yisrael. The tenth Bracha in the **שמונה עשרה** illustrates our yearning for redemption. "תקע בשופר גדול לחרותינו ושא נס לקבץ גלויותינו וקבצנו יחד מארבע כנפות הארץ ברוך אתה ה' מקבץ נדחי עמו ישראל". "Sound the great shofar of freedom, raise the banner to gather our exile and gather us together from the four corners of the earth. Blessed are you, Hashem, who gathers in the dispersed of his people Israel". The **עץ יוסף** asks an interesting question. Why do we need this Bracha, when the seventh Bracha, requests **גואל ישראל**, almost the same thing from Hashem? He answers

that the first Bracha refers to physical exile and the second refers to the spiritual exile. The immediate question to ask is how does this make sense in relation to the words in the aforementioned Bracha? Sound the Shofar! Raise the banner! Gather us together! All of these terms are very physical and active, contrary to what the **עץ יוסף** seems to say. In fact, the words in "גואל ישראל", the seventh Bracha seem to relate more to the spirit than to those of the tenth! "Behold our affliction, take up our grievance, and redeem us". Rabbi Tzvi Kalischer, 19th Century Rabbi and Harbinger of the Zionist idea, provides what I believe is the answer to this question. R' Kalischer was always known to be an extremely modest and spiritual man. In Europe he published many books on Halachah and on religious philosophy. In addition, Rabbi Kalischer staged discussions with members of the reform movement regarding observance and religious ideas, showing his strong attachment to tradition, as well as the issues of the day. In 1862, Rabbi Kalischer published his book Derishat Ziyyon which explained to Orthodox groups the idea of the
