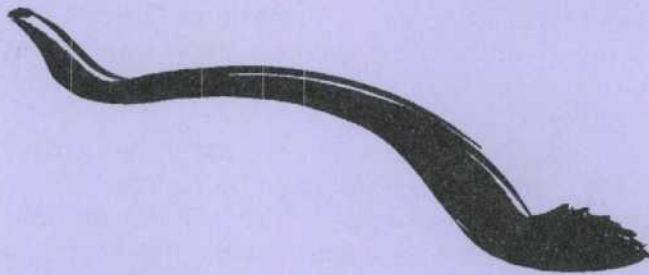

What's New in the Big Wide
World?

In a 22 hour operation, doctors at UCLA medical center have successfully separated siamese twins who were connected at the skull. The one year old South American girls, who came to the United States specifically for the surgery, remain in critical condition. But, their parents, as well as the doctors involved, are very hopeful.

Lawmakers on Long Island approved a ban on the mass release of balloons after schoolchildren expressed concern for wildlife. The bill applies to the release of more than 24 balloons and sets fines at \$500. The bill showed kids that they could make a difference in the world.

A fleet of six bicycle ambulances, complete with lights, sirens and defibrillators that can start a stopped heart, have hit the streets of London.
